NUWC employee wins hometown hero contest

MIDDLETOWN — People and animals who are hungry, homeless or sick were the real winners of a national contest won by a Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) Division Newport employee recently.

Five local charities benefited when Michelle S. Burgess, a mechanical engineer, was named the grand prize winner by Ace Hardware in the store's first Ace Hometown Hero Contest.

The awards ceremony was held recently at the local Ace Hardware retailer, Rocky's on West Main Road. Representatives of five selected charities picked by Burgess split the prize and received checks for \$1,000 each.

Charities included the R. I. Community Food Bank, Potter League for Animals, the R.I. Chapter of the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, Meals on Wheels of Rhode Island, and Lucy's Hearth.

For the contest Ace Hardware asked people nationwide to nominate their own "hometown hero" — someone who contributes immeasurable

time and energy to making a difference in the lives of others.

Leonora Bananto, a co-worker and friend, submitted Burgess' name. The Ace Hardware judges chose Burgess as the winner from over 500 entries.

"Ace Hardware developed this contest to find the person who embodies the American spirit in their own way," said Rocco Falcone, President of Rocky's Ace Hardware, at the award ceremony. "We're honored to award Michelle our Ace Hometown Hero award. Your selfless acts are to be commended. Your actions have truly made a difference."

Burgess and Bananto each received a \$1,000 Ace universal gift certificate. Nine national runners-up received a \$1,000 donation for their designated charities, as well as a \$500 Ace gift certificate.

"I can picture Michelle using her Ace gift certificate to buy things that she'll give to other people," said Clint Remington, retail business manager at Ace Hardware's Eastern Division. "She seems like that kind of person."

"Corny as it sounds, I just

like helping people," Burgess said. "Nothing beats knowing you've helped make someone's — or some animal's — day better."

Burgess said volunteering with the Special Olympics was among her most rewarding experiences. She has also volunteered for numerous NUWC activities such as the annual Christmas Families Appeal and the FIRST robotics competition.

She recently completed a battery of tests to determine whether she can donate a kidney to a co-worker. "She's a great friend, and she needed one," Burgess said. "I've got two and I only need one. Besides, good secretaries are hard to find!"

If she passes all the tests the transplant will probably happen in December.

Burgess' current work involves the Submarine Hatches and Lockout Chamber, and in her spare time she is studying corrosion for her Ph.D. dissertation research at the University of Rhode Island.

Burgess received her bachelor of science and master's degrees from the University of Maine at Orono.

The Salute to the First Rhode Island National Guard representatives, the United Veterans Council of Newport County, the Arthur M. Burton Post of VFW, the Newport American Legion, and the Youth Council, Newport County Branch NAACP, will participate.

A wreath-laying will conclude the ceremonies.

NAVSTA Newport hosts Career Decision Fair

The Navy Personnel Command in Millington, Tenn., wants to get the word out to all Sailors that the Navy makes a great career.

A traveling team from the Center for Career Development (CCD) will be in Newport Aug. 20 through 22 to help Naval Station Newport host its own Career Decision Fair. Briefs will be held for all hands, junior enlisted through senior officer personnel.

The fair is dedicated to giving career information directly to junior Sailors and officers and to training Command Retention Teams. It provides Sailors and their families with support to make informed, unemotional career decisions and provides commands with resources and information to assist their retention efforts, and "Stay Navy."

The most effective tool brought is detailers from various ratings. Detailers – your military career experts – will be available at the base's Career Decision Fair, and meet one-on-one with you and your family.

Each Career Decision Fair begins with a brief to the area commanding officers, executive officers, command master chiefs and command career counselors on specific tools they can use to encourage Sailors to Stay Navy.

All Sailors and Officers have a chance to attend a Career Information workshop. Each workshop targets a different audience, including junior enlisted, senior supervisor (E-7 to E-9, CWO, LDO), junior



officer and senior officer.

The workshop is an apples-to-apples comparison of Navy careers to civilian careers, and challenges many myths regarding compensation, relocations, and quality of life. Spouses and Ombudsmen are encouraged to attend.

The tentative schedule is:

Aug. 20, Senior Officer Briefing, for O4 and above, Naval Justice School auditorium, 12:30 to 2:30.

Aug. 21, Senior Enlisted Briefing, for E6 and above, Perry Hall Auditorium, 8:30 to 11 a.m.

Aug. 21, Junior Officer Briefing, O3 and below, Naval Justice School Auditorium, 12:30 to 3 p.m.

Aug. 21, Junior Enlisted Briefing, E5 and below, Building 1112 auditorium, 12:30 to 3 p.m.

Other briefings will be held for commanding officers, executive officers, command master chiefs and command career counselors.

Class of 2003 commence studies at War College

Newport, R.I. — The Naval War College (NWC) on Aug. 12 formally welcomed over 500 incoming students during convocation ceremonies in Spruance Auditorium.

Rear Adm. Rodney P. Rempt, President of the Naval War College, opened the event by calling on students to take advantage of their time in Newport.


"Your months of study here will be challenging, but rewarding. You are a part of something much larger than any single officer...and much bigger than any one program," said Rempt. "When you leave here you will recognize what many have learned before you — going to war is serious, risky and high stakes business. It takes smarts. Make the most of it."

The incoming class is comprised of 202 senior U.S. military officers and civilians in the College of Naval Warfare;

247 mid-grade U.S. military officers and civilians in the College of Naval Command and Staff; 46 senior international officers in the Naval Command College and 34 mid-grade international officers in the Naval Staff College.

The curriculum consists of courses in Strategy and Policy, National Security Decision Making, and Joint Military Operations. Successful students in both the College of Naval Warfare and College of Naval Command and Staff will graduate with a master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies. International students will receive diplomas.

"Until now, when you thought of war, your focus was on striking or maneuvering against specific targets...your objectives were clearly military and you sought quantifiable results, such as rounds on target. Starting now, your world becomes more complex. Henceforth, when you think of military activity, you

will consider how military objectives relate to political objectives," said Rempt.

Many of the incoming students are coming from operational units all over the world, including one member of the College of Naval Command and Staff, Navy Lt. Jerome R. Pilewski. Pilewski just completed a year-long tour in Bahrain, where he was the Tomahawk **GRADUATION, Page 13**

CCRI fall telecourses on Navy Cable TV

Newport Navy Cable Television and the Community College of Rhode Island (CCRI) offer 16 telecourses to military personnel for college credits that can be earned at home, beginning Monday, Sept. 9.

If interested in continuing your education, but just can't find the time to get to class on campus, CCRI offers this alternative. The telecourses are delivered solely through television. CCRI courses by television are different from on-campus only in the delivery method. Content, requirements, assignments, evaluation and testing procedures are the same. Delivery of course content by television offers accessibility and flexibility to learners who may have personal or professional responsibilities that prohibit travel to a campus.

Students need only to visit CCRI for orientation sessions, workshops, seminars and examinations. Registered students will receive their instructor's phone numbers if they have questions. Students may meet the instructor during his/her normal on-campus office hours or you may schedule an appointment. Credits for these courses are transferable to other institutions.

To view a particular course, note when it is airing on Newport Naval Cable and tune in during the broadcast date and time of the course. Courses offered on channel 13 for the 2002 fall semester are: Highlights of Astronomy (CC)/ *(Universe: The Infinite Frontier) The Infinite Frontier is an introductory astronomy course that covers four major content areas: Exploring the Sky, The Stars, The Universe of Galaxies, and Planets in Perspective. The video programs contain footage from NASA, the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, the European Space Agency, the Hubble space telescope, and observatories around the world. State-of-the-art animation and computer graphics and interviews with numerous leading astronomers provide informed and provocative insights into current astronomical and planetary research. It airs Monday, 10 to 10:55 a.m. and Monday, 6 to

6:55 p.m. (This course is an elective and does not fulfill a science requirement.)

Human Health and Disease (CC)/ *(Living with Health) Living With Health is a fascinating, "user-friendly" guide to healthy living. This introductory health telecourse encourages students to take a proactive stance toward maintaining health, with focus on the lifestyle components that encourage wellness. Living with Health encompasses all areas of health: the physical, emotional, social, intellectual, and spiritual.

Introduction to Business (CC)/ *(It's Strictly Business)

A one-semester course with stress placed upon the types of business proprietorship and the effective organization of business under modern economic conditions. Emphasis is placed upon the functional departmental organization of present day business.

Small Business Administration (CC) *(Something Ventured)

A deploying experience

ON NARRAGANSETT BAY — If you want to learn to ride a bike, you have to get on and start pedaling.

If you want to learn to drive a ship in the U.S. Navy, you have to practice on a Yard Patrol (YP) Craft, a 107-foot vessel with a scaled-down version of a working bridge.

The U.S. Naval Academy (USNA) in Annapolis, Md., maintains a fleet of YPs and insists they are the best way to teach navigation and ship handling. Each year it sends its entire third class of midshipmen on a three-week cruise on the YPs.

"It is an excellent program," said Chief Boatswain's Mate Frank Swanson of YP 680. "The midshipmen learn what it's like to run a ship.

How else would they learn that before going to the fleet?"

The midshipmen stand all the duty stations, including conning officer, leehelm, helm, navigator, radioman and lookout.

Surface Warfare Office School, Division Officer Course, (SWOS-DOC) agrees with the Naval Academy's assessment. So while six YPs stopped in Newport last month for midshipman training, some ensigns recently had the chance to board the craft at Pier Two and go to sea.

While the ensigns are aboard they run a number of "bumper drills" or maneuvers that simulate returning to pier berthing, and departing.

The USNA graduates, all familiar with the YP, were nervous about driving, but knew the layout of the **YARD PATROL, Page 9**

bridge. They moved about with ease.

The other SWOSDOC students hung back and were not as willing to participate at first without watching how the Annapolis alumni handled the ship.

Ens. Jennifer Moore, a Naval Academy Preparatory School (NAPS) and Annapolis graduate, was the first conning officer aboard the YP.

She said her previous experiences aboard a YP helped her gain a little more confidence in

driving, and helped her get over her nervousness.

Ens. Marisa Ball, also a NAPS and Annapolis graduate, said, "They should incorporate YPs into the training at SWOS. Simulators alone can't teach you to drive a ship."

Other students echoed this sentiment as well. Their concern is that the ship simulators in Callaghan Hall do not let them experience the effects of wind and current, which are very real factors when driving a ship.

Ens. Drew Myers, SWOSDOC Class 150, said that he liked the YP training, and he felt it helped him prepare for his next assignment — a frigate homeported in Yokosuka, Japan.



Composition I (CC)/ *(The Writer's Exchange) Each program presents a principle of writing-rhetoric or process and shows students how this principle applies to real-life situations through the use of case studies.

The case study approach provides a graphic illustration of the practical importance of writing and helps students improve their writing skills. For example, a case study might show a typical college student writer using heuristic software in a writing lab situation to generate ideas for a composition or focus on an adult in the workplace using some aspect of rhetoric or of the writing process to produce a document such as a business proposal. In addition to three or four brief case studies, each program also includes a well-known professor or writing professional that comments on the case studies and explains how the information in each segment can be used by the student.

Taking a balanced view of each important national event and crisis, the American Adventure portrays the political leaders, reformers, artisans, explorers, farmers, soldiers, immigrants, industrialists, artists, and "good old boys" that contributed to panorama of American life.

Law of Contracts/ *(Business and the Law). Business and the Law, as with most introductory law courses, emphasizes contracts and the legal system. By including modules on the law and sales, commercial paper, agency, and property—and examining such critical legal environment topics as government regulation, employment practices, and consumer and environment protection—students will gain a comprehensive overview of law and the world of business.

College Algebra (Intermediate Algebra) (CC)/ *(Interme-

diate Algebra: Modeling the World) Modeling the World applies algebraic principles to real-world settings as it lays the important groundwork for future study in college mathematics. This series uses examples from everyday life to create meaningful lessons. As the curriculum comes alive through application, students will appreciate how algebra provides solutions to a broad range of problems.

It airs Friday, 11 to 11:55 a.m. and Friday, 2 to 2:55p.m. (Prerequisite: MATH-0600 or its equivalent).

Business Mathematics/ *(By the Numbers). By the Numbers is an innovative business mathematics telecourse. The content evolves from mathematical foundations, to basic business concepts and then incorporates mathematics of retailing, mathematics of finance, business accounting concepts, and communication with numbers. These concepts are interwoven with practical applications: constructing a building, investing money, setting prices of products. Prerequisite: MATH-0500 or its equivalent.

It airs Saturday, 1 to 1:55p.m. and 6 to 6:55 p.m. (Prerequisite: MATH-0500 or its equivalent)

Introduction to Oceanography/ *(Oceanus) A study of the total marine environment with emphasis on basic facts and principles of physical, chemi-

cal, biological and geological oceanography. Topics include the origin or oceans and the composition and History of seawater, oceanic currents, tides waves and beaches.

It airs Sunday, 1 to 1:55 p.m. and 6 to 6:55p.m.

Introduction to Philosophy (CC)/ *(Introduction to The Examined Life) Offering learners an in-depth analysis of the Western world. The Examined Life studies the "great questions" that have intrigued philosophers from antiquity to the present. Using writings of past philosophers and interviews with more than 50 contemporary thinkers, the telecourse episodes underscore how such questions as what is art? Does God exist? What is the meaning of life? Does the end justify the means?

It airs Monday, noon to 12:55 p.m. and Wednesday, noon to 12:55p.m.

General Psychology/ *(Study of Human Behavior) Study of Human Behavior covers the fundamental principles and major concepts of psychology including: brain and behavior, sensation and perception, conditioning and learning, cognitive processes, motivation and emotion, life-span development, the self and identity, sex and gender, testing and intelligence, social influences, psychopathology and therapy, stress and health issues, methodology and new directions. It airs Tuesday,

noon to 12:55p.m. and Thursday, noon to 12:55p.m.

General Sociology/ *(The Sociological Imagination) This course offers students clues to understanding the myriad of sociological events of our time. Through interviews with renowned social scientists and close examination of the portions of society experiencing changes, this course explores the intersection of history and biography in our society where the social conditions of the present relate to the attitude of the recent past.

Basic Spoken Spanish I/ *(Conversemos – Let's Talk) A one-semester course for beginners. Emphasis will be on correct pronunciation of basic vocabulary in everyday conversations. Dialogues for travel and other practical use will be learned. This introduction to Spanish will prepare the student who never studied Spanish to use the language correctly within a limited context and to understand its basic structure.


