# 100 Naval Reservists due home from Crete

WARWICK, R.I. — One hundred naval reservists attached to Mobile Inshore Undersea Warfare Unit (MIUWU) 202 and Inshore Boat Unit (IBU), who were deployed overseas last winter from Naval Station Newport to support Operations Noble Eagle and Enduring Freedom, are expected to arrive at Green State Airport tonight at 9.

Naval Coastal Warfare (NCW) Detachment, Souda Bay, Crete, Greece relies heavily on reservists, so MIUWU and IBU were activated to the Marathi

naval pier complex there.

They protected incoming and outgoing U.S. Navy ships and submarines, and NATO ships from potential threats.

Members of the reserve units, who left last February, are primarily homeported in Newport, R.I., and are attached to NCW Group 2, from Williamsburg, Va. Others are either attached to U.S. Naval Support Activity 0197, Souda Bay, Crete, homeported in Brunswick, Maine, or cross-assigned from several units in various states.

MIUWU-202, which has about 10 percent active duty military personnel, provides security from shore with electronic sensors and other equipment. IBU-21 patrols from the water.

“Our job was to provide surface and subsurface surveillance in inshore areas throughout the world, and the best tool for that is the human eye. It’s the best asset,” said Lt. Kevin Quinn, electronic material officer for MIUWU-202.

After weekend liberty, MIUW-202 and IBU-21 will reform at Building W-

36, Naval Station Newport, on Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. for official welcome home ceremonies.

Rear Adm. Roger T. Nolan, Commander, Naval Reserve Readiness Command, Northeast, will speak; and staff officers from the Navy Marine Corps Reserve Center, Providence, will present a plaque to the returning units’ commanding officers.

## ‘Stay Navy’ rewards accented

### Career Decision Fair outlines benefits of military career

There is much to consider when choosing a career, and it can be even more complicated when the choices are the private sector or staying in the Navy.

Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport sponsored a Career Decision Fair, Aug. 20-22. A mobile team from the Center for Career Development at the Navy Personnel Command in Millington, Tenn., led a series of seminars to help active duty members make well informed, unemotional decisions.


Over the two-day period, facilitators held community-specific workshops (junior enlisted, junior officer, senior enlisted, senior officer) to address specific topics and concerns.

Workshops held for junior personnel focused on information on differing elements such as structure and organization, pay and benefits, career paths, educational and advancement opportunities, and employment/retirement security.

“There is a distinct difference between a job and a career,” said facilitator David Rutherford, who served nearly 30 years in the military.

“A job is a means to pay the bills. A career, on the other hand, offers a sense of value, contribution and opportunity. And the Navy offers just that.” Rutherford spoke at both the senior and junior enlisted seminars.

Gunner’s Mate First Class (Surface Warfare) Bobby Johnson hoped the seminar would

help those junior to him see the full picture and make wise choices.

“For myself, I have 17 years in and I’m leaving here thinking how staying Navy (beyond 20 years) is beneficial for myself and the Navy.”

Given today’s economy and job market, Rutherford said the military is the most secure choice today.

“There is no real security in the private sector,” said Rutherford. “There continues to be massive layoffs. With reorganization and downsizing and fierce competition for positions, there are no guarantees. Your retirement from the military is.”

Command Master Chiefs Larry Cairo and Gary Loy from

the Center for Career Development and members of the team from Navy Personnel Command, said numerous factors dictate why service members consider a career in the private sector. But the major reason is pay.

“You can’t just look at the bottom line,” said Master Chief Loy. “We try and help them see everything in between.”

For example, an E-5 with six years earns a base salary of about \$30,000, while someone with the same skills on the private sector may earn \$56,000.

“When you include the housing allowance, savings from Commissary and Exchange privileges, tuition assistance it can equal out.”

## NUWC Newport changes command

Capt. Bloomfield, who has commanded the Newport Division since September 2000, will report to the Navy’s Warfare Systems Engineering Program Office in Washington.

# SWOS project to begin soon

The contractor hired to build the Surface Warfare Officers School Command's new Applied Instruction Building expects to begin construction within two to three weeks, and, weather permitting, could finish the job in nine months.

Jon Archer, Vice President of Triton Marine Construction, spoke at groundbreaking ceremonies last Friday for the \$13.4 million three story building behind Weakley and Arleigh Burke Halls.

"This will be a design-build concept," he said. "The Navy can make adjustments to the original design as we go along to avoid costly job change orders."

Triton has won contracts for 50 military projects over the past 20 years.

He said one-day workshops between Navy engineering representatives and the contractor will be held regularly throughout the project. The architect, Haskell

Co. of Jacksonville, Fla., will submit three or four design options.


The Applied Instruction Building will allow SWOSCOLCOM to consolidate the Division Officer School with the command on Coasters' Harbor Island. The school is currently housed in Callaghan Hall on Coddington Point.

Capt. Ronald Brinkley, Commanding Officer, SWOSCOLCOM, said the groundbreaking is the first step in the culmination of a decade-long effort for construction.

"Today marks the beginning of a new future for Navy surface warfare training," he said.

The building will be a state-of-the-art training facility. It will have 16 advanced electronic classrooms with a computer terminal for each student. The

# War College to unveil Sept. 11 Memorial to 3 students, 7 alumni

The Naval War College will hold ceremonies Monday, Sept. 9, at 10 a.m. to honor three NWC students and seven alumni who were killed in the Sept. 11 terrorist attack on the Pentagon.

The three Washington D.C.-based students who were actively enrolled at the time of the attack were Ms. Angela Houtz, 27, of LaPlata, Md.; Lt. Jonas Panik, 26, of Mingoville, Pa.; and Cmdr. Dan Shanower, 40, of Naperville, Ill. All three were serving in the Chief of Naval Operations Intelligence Department at the Pentagon.

Cmdr. Shanower commanded the 28-person unit, and Ms. Houtz was the youngest civilian to ever be named as senior-day analyst. Lt. Panik, a highly-respected briefer, had been with the unit over a year.

The seven alumni were Capt. Gerald F. Deconto, 44, of Sandwich, Mass.; Lt. Cmdr Robert R. Elseth, 37, of Vestal, N.Y.; Capt. Lawrence D. Getzfred, 57, of Elgin, Neb.; Cmdr. Patrick J. Murphy, 38, of Flossmoor, Ill.; retired Capt. Jack Punches, 51, of Clifton, Va.; Cmdr. Robert A. Schlegel, 38, of Gray, Maine; and Army Maj. Kip Taylor, 38, of McLean, Va.

The alumni who will be honored include a cross section of active-duty and reserve officers from the aviation, submarine, surface warfare and per-

sonnel communities. All were assigned to the Pentagon during the attack.

The ceremony will include the unveiling of a memorial which consists of a piece of limestone removed from the damaged portion of the Pentagon. The limestone was transported to the Naval War College by Seabees from the Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 23 last March.

Benches, bronze plaques, special lighting and landscaping will surround the limestone.

The memorial, which is located between Conolly and McCarty Little Halls on the grounds of the Naval War College, has been made possible through private donations to a memorial fund sponsored by the Naval War College Foundation.

Rear Adm. Rodney P. Rempt, President of the Naval War College and Cmdr. Karl Van Dusen, a Naval War College graduate who survived the attack and was recognized for his heroism in assisting others from the damaged building, will offer remarks at the ceremony.

Family members of the heroes, local dignitaries and members of the Newport naval community will attend the ceremony. The memorial will be unveiled and dedicated.

When you come to the Pharmacy for service, it is required that an ID card be presented for the intended patient. This is done to facilitate eligibility checks on our beneficiaries.

## Pharmacy Evolutions

We understand that it is inconvenient to take your spouse or dependant's ID card from them for the day, so we will accept a legible photocopy (front and back) to simplify this process.

Are you tired of being asked if your address and phone number is up to date on your DEERS Eligibility form? I think an explanation is in order.

By processing a DEERS eligibility form for every customer, we are doing our best to update your information in our database, while also ensuring that all of the people that we serve are eligible for our care. This extra step in your check-in procedure is actually saving the Navy money and may allow us to improve our services.

In addition, you will only be asked this information once per visit to NACC Newport. At your first stop in the facility, you will be given a form that you will present at all subsequent stops in that day, which negates the need for asking for your information at every site you visit on any given day.

Because of the ever-changing pharmaceutical world, our formulary changes periodically. The following additions have been made to the NACC-formulary: ADVAIR, PREM-PRO, PLAVIX, WELLBUTRIN, SEROQUEL, LUMIGAN and SERZONE, PREVIDENT PLUS, LANTUS, HUMALOG, AND OCUFLOX. ## Let's get physical at NACC's clinics

Going back to school is usually easy after the shopping is done, right?

Wrong!

Keeping up with children's physicals and immunizations are a yearly responsibility. School nurses have children's medical records on file and know who's lacking what. However, the best person to ask is the child's physician, who has seen the child on a regular basis.

The Naval Ambulatory Care Center, Newport, accepts appointments for physicals during its regular operating hours.

Pediatrics Clinic appointments can be made at 841-6074.

If a child already has an updated physical and requires only a vaccination, the Immunizations Clinic is open from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every Monday through Friday, except for Wednesday, when it is open from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. The clinic number is 841-6037.

The state of Rhode Island's immunization requirements for all grades are as follows: DTP/DtaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis), TD (Tetanus and Diphtheria), POLIO-OPV (Oral Poliovirus), POLIO-IPV (Inactivated Poliovirus), MMR (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella).

For kindergarten through Grade 3 and 7 to 9, Hepatitis B and the varicella vaccine (chicken pox) are mandato-

ry. In place of the chicken pox vaccine, if the child has had the chicken pox, a note from the doctor with the date of the infection is suitable. Lead screening is done for all kindergarten students.

Since Oct. 30, 2000, TRICARE has enforced the 2001 National Defense Authorization Act, which includes school physical exams in the TRICARE benefits. School physicals are a preventive service, so paperwork may be filled out along with the saved receipts for all TRICARE-eligible beneficiaries ages five through eleven for reimbursement. Sports physicals are excluded.

Claim forms may be downloaded from the TRICARE Web site at [www.tricare.osd.mil](http://www.tricare.osd.mil), or you may contact a local TRICARE Service Center.

The first of school varies from town to town, day, and grade to grade, but no matter what day it is, the kids will be there at their bus stops ready to go.

All Newport public schools open this year on Sept. 4. Middletown students, kindergarten through Grade 9, also return Sept. 4. Middletown Grades 10 through 12 go back Sept. 5.

In Portsmouth, kindergarten through Grade 9 pupils head to school Sept. 3, while Grades 10 through 12 wait until Sept. 4.

Motorists are reminded that with school buses back on the road next week, flashing red lights mean traffic stops on both sides of the road.



"Bridge watching is down to three or four people, we have automatic plotters for navigation, laser guided missiles and electric drive ships are next."

He said now we train with Power Point presentations, DVDs, VHS, CDs and virtual reality. "This new building will help new officers lead the Navy of 2042," he said.

Lt. Marcus Bickley, project information officer, said enrollment in SWOSDOC classes in Newport has grown to 1,100 per year since the command closed its school in Coronado, Calif., in 1994.

Currently, five to six SWOSDOC classes pass through Newport each year, with up to 200 per class. However, SWOS next year will streamline its program from six months to six weeks or less.

Funding for the building was included in the \$10.5 billion Military Construction Appropriations Act for fiscal 2002. The bill passed the House and Senate last fall.

## Navy-wide news

### CNO and MCPON tour high-speed catamaran

ABOARD JOINT VENTURE (NNS) — Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Vern Clark and Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (SS/AW) Terry Scott recently toured the experimental, high-speed catamaran Joint Venture (HSV-X1) and spoke with the ship's crew.

The Joint Venture is currently undergoing joint service experimentation coordinated by the Navy Warfare Development Command. It visited Newport, R.I., headquarters for the command, last year.

"This experiment in our future is critical to the United States Navy of the 21st century," said Clark. "I have said that I don't care what the hull form looks like. I want it to go fast, and I want it to go take on the enemy in the inland areas where we are likely to be tested in the future."

The ship was designed and built by Australian shipbuilders Bollinger, Incat L.L.C. and was leased for two years to the Tank-Automotive and Armament Command for experimentation.

Joint Venture has undergone extensive technical and structural modification to meet the military's requirements.

Modifications include the installation of a helicopter pad suitable for large helicopters such as the SH-60 Seahawk and the CH-46 Sea Knight.

The 370 foot vessel is propelled by four diesel engines and can travel at speeds over 45 knots. Its shallow 12 foot draft allows Joint Venture to operate in waters close to shore. With a crew of only about 30 crewmembers, Sailors must be competent in a variety of areas to meet mission requirements.

### Naval Station Keflavík welcomes 170 Russian sailors and officers

KEFLAVIK, ICELAND (NNS) — U.S. Naval Air Station Keflavik hosted over 170 officers and Sailors of the Russian Navy recently for an afternoon of friendship and cultural exchange.

The visit was part of a larger stop in Iceland by the Russian Northern Fleet, only the third such visit in history.

The first visit took place in 1870 and the last in 1969.

According to Deputy Russian Northern Fleet Commander-in-Chief, Vice Adm. Vladimir Dobroskotchenko, this visit to Iceland is an official one to improve relations between the two countries.

"This was such a great opportunity to mix with a different culture. We even seem to be able to communicate with each other in spite of the fact that our languages are so different," said Information Systems Technician Third Class Kathleen Schwed.

### Newest destroyer delivered to Navy

PASCAGOULA, Miss. (NNS) — The Navy took delivery of its newest destroyer, USS Preble, Aug. 12 from Northrop Grumann Ships Systems Ingalls Operations in Pascagoula, Miss.

Preble, the 38th ship in the DDG 51 Arleigh Burke-class, is the 17th Aegis guided-missile destroyer built by Ingalls Operations, in coordination with the Navy's Supervisor of Shipbuilding, Conversion and Repair Pascagoula, a field activity of Naval Sea Systems Command.

These multi-mission ships can conduct a variety of operations, from peacetime presence and crisis management to sea control and power projection, in support of the national military strategy. The combatant ships are equipped with the Navy's Aegis combat systems, which combines satellite-based communication, radar and weapons technologies in a single platform for unlimited flexibility while operating "Forward... from the Sea."

DDG 88 is the sixth ship named in honor of Cmdr. Edward Preble, (1761-1807), a pioneer in U.S. naval and merchant marine service.

Cmdr. Timothy Batzler, a Baltimore native and a 1983 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, is Preble's prospective commanding officer.

Preble will be commissioned in Boston on Nov. 9.
