

Naval Station Newport plans to close Read Street at Chase's Lane, Middletown, on weekdays to eliminate a shortcut through Navy housing.



# NAVSTA will close Read St. shortcut

MIDDLETOWN — Because of safety concerns, access to Read Street in Navy housing from Chase's Lane will be limited effective Aug. 7.

The Navy plans to install a gate, which will close off the area from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. each weekday to eliminate an increasing traffic problem and danger to Navy family housing residents. The sidewalk will remain open.

The Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport Housing director, Charles R. Silvia, said the streets through the residential neighborhoods of Coddington Cove and Anchorage Navy Family Housing are being used as thoroughfares between the Access Highway and Cod-

dington Highway to avoid the traffic on West Main Road.

Besides commuters, delivery trucks also are using the shortcut, he said.

There are stop signs at each intersection and the posted speed limit is 15 mph, but they are frequently ignored. NAVSTA Police routinely patrols this area, however, due to manpower constraints a full-time police officer to control the traffic is not a viable option.

"Traffic through our Cove and Anchorage Housing areas, especially down Lexington Street, is being funneled into Read Street, which empties on Chase's Lane," Silvia said. Lake Eire, Lawrence and Niagara Streets have no egress on their north ends.

The Housing Office surveyed Navy



The following policy regarding utilization of Gym 109 and FITNESS Plus during periods of extremely warm and humid weather will be in effect until further notice.

**YELLOW FLAG**—(85 to 87 degrees) Activity advised only for members who have been exercising in similar conditions for 10 or more days.

**RED FLAG** — (88 to 94 degrees) Activity advised only for members who have been exercising in said conditions for 30 days or longer.

**BLACK FLAG** — (temperature in facilities reach 95 degrees or over) Gym facilities, with the exception of locker and shower rooms will secure.

Flags will be prominently posted at the main entrance to Gym 109. Patrons are urged to exercise caution in order to avoid heat-related stress and health problems. diary, negotiator with creditors to establish a reasonable and mutually acceptable repayment plan.



ranking Democrat on the House Appropriations Defense Subcommittee, visited NUWC's Stillwater Basin testing area on Burma Road.

"Congressman Murtha, as the senior ranking member on the Defense Subcommittee, has authority over a wide range of programs that are vitally important to the defense industry," said Kennedy, who is also a member of the Appropriations Committee.

"I am excited to show Congressman Murtha the significant contributions to our nation's defense made by contractors and Navy activities on Aquidneck Island."

The 7-meter prototype, called Spartan, was remotely piloted through the basin area, then hauled out pierside for a closer look by the Congressmen.

The project engineer said Spartan can cruise the littorals or inland waterways, ports and harbors, and gather information on chemical, biological and explosive threats, drug trafficking, communication

systems, submerged mines, guerrilla troop movements, and other suspicious activities.

"It has the capability of alleviating what the Coast Guard has been doing in patrolling harbors for homeland defense, and letting them get back their usual maritime and fisheries enforcement work," said one spokesman on the project.

Following the Spartan briefing, the Washington entourage visited NUWC's Warfare Systems Presentation Facility for a virtual reality demonstration on submarine conversions.

After NUWC, the Congressmen visited the Navy Warfare Development Command at the Naval War College complex. Earlier in the day the lawmakers toured Raytheon in Portsmouth which last spring landed a \$1.36 billion contract to design the combat system for the new DD-X Series warship.

Congressman Kennedy then hosted a luncheon for Congressman Murtha and approximately 50 defense contractors and Navy officials at the Officers' Club.



"People have been telling me that shipboard life can be really tough," said Rodriguez, "But actually being out here on a ship, it just shows me that the other people really didn't know what they were talking about. Everyone here seems pretty cool to me."

## More Sailors enroll in TSP

WASHINGTON (NNS) — With less than a month left in the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) open season, nearly 74,000 active and reserve Sailors are positioning themselves for a more prosperous future.

Sailors are leading the way in Thrift Savings Plan involvement with 4,470 new active duty enrollees, twice the number of new enrollees as all the other services combined.

TSP is a way to save and invest money on a tax-deferred basis. That is, contributions and earnings are not reported as income until they're withdrawn from the plan. TSP is a government-run plan that has historically had good rates of return with very low administrative costs.

The largest group of Sailors investing in TSP are E-1s, comprising over 900 new enrollees. At an early age these Sailors have learned the value of "paying yourself first."

No matter how much time a Sailor has to invest in TSP, it can be a sound financial decision. TSP investments are 'portable' - you can keep it if you leave military service. Money invested

in a TSP account may be rolled over to another IRS eligible retirement plan after leaving military service.

Thus a TSP account can have a valuable place in any retirement planning scenario.

Sailors may sign up for TSP or increase their contributions up to the allowable limit from now through July 31. Enrollment for TSP or investment

changes can be done online at the Department of Defense Employee/Member Self Service Web site <http://emss.dfas.mil/emss.htm>.

Contributions can range from as little as one percent to seven percent of basic pay; also, bonus and incentive pay may be contributed — up to \$11,000 in 2002.
