



# Patriotic band concert to end in fireworks

Navy Band Northeast will perform patriotic favorites as part of its "Star Spangled Spectacular" concert on Friday, June 28, on Dewey Field.

The evening will conclude with a dazzling fireworks display over Narragansett Bay.

Rhode Island Sound, the band's own rock group, will get the festivities started with contemporary rock favorites beginning at 5 p.m. They will be followed at 7 p.m. by the North Providence Community Chorus, who will perform a program of patriotic music.

The Concert Band, composed of Navy and civilian musicians, will then take the stage, performing patriotic favorites such as the *1812 Overture* and *Stars and Stripes Forever*. A moment of silence will be observed to commemorate those who lost their lives on Sept. 11 and in the continuing war on terrorism.

There will also be a salute to all veterans of all services. The concert is free and the public is invited as guests of the Commanding Officer, Naval Station Newport. Concertgoers should bring chairs and blankets and enter the Naval Station through Gate One, the main entrance near the Officers' Club; Gate 11

opposite the Naval Undersea Warfare Center; or Gate Four on Coddington Highway. The Officers' Club will sell concessions on Dewey Field, offering a selection of hamburgers, hot dogs, soda, beer, wine, ice cream, and more, beginning at 5 p.m. Rain date is Saturday, June 29.

# SECNAV says Navy aiming at 'unmanning' everything

Secretary of the Navy Gordon England said technology will be the driving force for the Navy in the 21st century, and four trends will continue: to precision everything, to network everything, to stealth everything, and to "unman" everything.

England was the lead speaker Tuesday in the 53rd annual Current Strategy Forum at the Naval War College. The forum focused on the war on terrorism, national security and the role of naval and maritime forces.

Commenting on the war in Afghanistan, England said no one knows how long it will last. "But it's going to be a long war. This is not going to be a war of a couple of years."

The former executive vice president of General Dynamics said there is lots of discussion about transformation in the military from a conscripted force to an all-volunteer force.

"But we have not made one single change in the organization," he said. "We have highly educated and motivated people, but still have the identical layer structure and command system."

England said the Navy still has a conscription mentality. "We still have people doing all sorts of jobs that are not jobs dealing with the military. They are just jobs carried over from the past."

He said the military workforce is too narrowly trained, and it would be a much better job environment if it could apply a broad range of skills to a broad range of applications.

England also said the U.S. combat capability is changing dramatically. "In Operation Desert Storm it took 205 days to get on the offensive. The first strikes against Afghanistan in Operation Enduring Freedom occurred in 30 days.

The carrier USS Enterprise was re-tasked and on station in the region within three days of Sept. 11. Eighty percent of our modern weapons are precision weapons, he said.

"I would contend our 300 ship Navy is far more potent than our 600 ship Navy of the 1980s was.

"That doesn't mean we don't need more ships," he said. "I am a proponent for more ships, but I am also a

proponent for measuring what really counts and that is capability."

England said the Navy will soon implement a discretionary fund for all Carrier Battle Group commanders.

In a battlefield trial test, each commander will receive \$1 million to be used for laptops, computer software or other technology to be innovative.

England said most of the military budget is tied up in the maintenance and supply chain, and only 14 percent is applied to actual combat.

# Capt. Mickey named Commander of NUWC

MIDDLETOWN — The Navy has announced the selection of Capt. John C. Mickey as prospective Commander, Naval Undersea Warfare Center Division, Newport. He will relieve Capt. Patrick Bloomfield in late August.

Capt. Mickey, a native of Wellsboro, Pa., received his commission in 1979 through the NROTC program at the University of Pennsylvania, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in chemical engineering.

Mickey taught NROTC courses in naval engineering and weapon systems at the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass., and earned a master's in business administration from Anna Maria Col-

lege. After several sea and shore assignments, Mickey reported to the Submarine Warfare Systems Engineering Office in January 2001.

In May 2001, he transferred to the Submarine Sensors Program Office (PMS435), and in June, relieved as the Program Manager.

Mickey's awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (four awards) and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (three awards).

He is married to the former Brenda Larson of Newport, R.I. Capt. Bloomfield, who has commanded the Newport Division since September 2000, has been selected to head the Warfare Systems Engineering Program Office (PMS401) as Program Manager. PMS401 is located in Washington, D.C.

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# Adm. McGann retires as War College provost

Rear Adm. Barbara McGann, Naval War College Provost, retired after 32 years of naval service in formal ceremonies last Friday in Spruance Auditorium.

McGann, a Newport native, was named the new executive director of the Rhode Island Red Cross and will assume her new duties in Providence later this month.

Vice Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. William J. Fallon, spoke about McGann's service to her nation, saying she was the "right leader to lead the Naval War College into the 21st century."

Fallon also applauded the Rhode Island Red Cross, who he said, "couldn't have picked a better leader" for their organization.

For the past two years, McGann has overseen the War College's academic and research programs, as well as a world-renowned faculty. The college is the premier center of strategic thought and National Security policy innovation for the Navy.

Rear Adm. Rodney P. Rempt, president of the college, joined in the praise for McGann as a leader and role-model for women.

"During her service, Adm. McGann has had a lasting impact on both the Navy and more importantly the people who serve in our Navy," he said.

"She demonstrated strong leadership during every single tour, especially during her first tours where she excelled as a young woman officer when it was at times not easy to do so. In each of these positions, she has focused on people, and the result has always been a better Navy."

In her remarks, McGann praised the heroes in her life, including all members of the Armed Services who she said, "do extraordinary things on a daily basis."

In regards to her retirement, McGann quoted former President Lyndon B. Johnson, saying, "it hurts good."

The Naval War College was founded in 1884 to enhance the abilities of its students to make sound decisions in command, staff, and management positions and to develop a sound undertaking of strategy to include naval, joint and combined campaigns.

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

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## TRICARE corner

### Exercise is health benefit, but don't overdo it

Studies show that inactive people are almost twice as likely to develop heart disease than those who exercise regularly. Daily physical activity like walking, stair climbing, gardening and yard work can help reduce the risk of heart disease.

Vigorous exercise like swimming, brisk walking and running can help improve fitness of the heart and lungs, which can provide benefits for lowering heart disease risk. These kinds of activities are sometimes called "aerobic." During aerobic exercise, the body uses oxygen to produce energy needed for the activity. Aerobic exercises can condition the heart and lungs if performed at the proper intensity for at least 30 minutes, three to four times a week.

Regular physical activity provides more energy, helps in coping with stress and

improves self-image. It can also increase resistance to fatigue and help you relax. At the same time, it improves the ability to fall asleep quickly and sleep well.

Exercise also tones your muscles, burns off calories to help you lose extra pounds and helps control your appetite. You need to burn 3,500 calories more than you take in to lose one pound.

Exercising too hard is not beneficial and is especially strenuous for out-of-shape, middle-aged and older people. The most common risk is injury to muscles and joints. This usually happens from exercising too hard or for too long.

To avoid injury, get a medical checkup before starting any exercise program and learn how to exercise properly. Wear appropriate clothing and shoes and drink plenty of water before, during and after exercising.
