New company adapts lasers for marksmanship training

MIDDLETOWN — Shell casings littered the carpet of the conference room at Anteon Corp. offices last Monday, as two Navy gunner's mates fired an M-60 machine gun and an M-16 assault rifle.

The pop of the small arms fire soon mixed with the odor of gunpowder as it wafted out into the corridor.

But instead of live rounds piercing the wall, a computer read a laser beam attached to the rifle muzzles and recorded the hits on target. With each pull of the trigger, a hole was recorded on a computer monitor screen.

Office workers, munching on cheese and crackers, casually observed the demonstration by BEAMHIT LLC of Columbia, Md., which opened its National Distance Learning Marksmanship Training System Center at One Corporate Place.

In a press conference headed by U.S. Rep. Patrick Kennedy, D-R.I., BEAMHIT executives targeted an Army and Navy audience at its indoor "groundbreaking." The processing center will be on the third floor of Anteon's offices. Anteon is a primary Department of Defense contractor specializing in information technology and engineering solutions.

Spokesman Charles Mark said the company currently has contracts with the Army National Guard, and the U.S. Naval Reserves are committed to the concept.

With basic infrared laser beam technology and simple software programs, soldiers, Marines and sailors can set up rifle or pistol ranges in a classroom or corridor and practice marksmanship without the danger or expense of live rounds, or hazards to the envi-

ronment from lead slugs.

The results can be transmitted online to an instructor in another state. The concept eliminates the need for active duty or reserves to physically travel hours to an authorized pistol range for qualification training.

Rep. Kennedy, who was instrumental in locating the business in Middletown, said it "is indicative of the ongoing transformation of Newport County into a high-tech incubator the Armed Services."

Admiral outlines operational vision

Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. Vern Clark, used the Naval War College's 53rd annual Current Strategy Forum last week to introduce his new operational vision for the Navy, entitled 'Sea Power 21.'

"To prepare for the wide array of threats facing us, we must organize ourselves around a clear, concise, and powerful vision of what the Navy will provide our nation in the decades ahead," he said. "This vision must build on U.S. strengths — our asymmetric advantages — such as information superiority, sea control, mobility, stealth, reach, precision and firepower."

According to Clark, at the heart of the 'sea power' vision for the 21st century are three concepts: Sea Strike — the projection of offensive power; Sea Shield — the projection of defensive power; and Sea Basing — the projection of sovereignty to team with and to provide enhanced support for joint forces afloat and ashore.

"A perfect example is Operation Enduring Freedom. In Afghanistan, 80 percent of Navy strike sorties attacked

targets that were unknown to the aircrews when they left the carrier. They relied upon networked sensors and joint communications to swiftly respond to targets of opportunity."

The second phase of 'Sea Power 21,' Sea Shield, is key to protecting our nation at home, said Clark.

"Sea Shield extends homeland security to the fullest extent using forward deployed forces, buying time and space for the detection and tracking of threats

headed toward our country." Clark said, "The defensive value of an afloat missile defense system will complement the offensive capabilities of Sea Shield."

In regard to Sea Basing, Clark emphasized the advantage of projecting sovereignty around the world.

"The independence of naval vessels operating on the high seas allows us to conduct combat operations anywhere, anytime without having to first ask for permission."

According to Clark, sea based forces will be aided significantly by the additions of the DD(X) destroyer and its associated family of ships.

Over 1,200 people attended this year's conference, entitled, "Transforming American National Security Strategy in the 21st Century."

War College war game helps N.Y. police in crisis response

New York City Police Commissioner Ray Kelly and 20 top officials from the NYPD took part in a two-day seminar war game at the Naval War College, June 18-19, designed to explore ways police can counter threats to homeland security.

According to Kelly, the scripted exercises will help prepare the department in responding to major events.

"This is something the military does on a regular basis and we will be doing more of," said Kelly. "The Naval War College worked on the scenarios. We didn't necessarily want to know the scenarios before we got there."

"As our senior government leaders have recently acknowledged, it is no longer a question of if terrorists will strike again, but a question of when and how they will attack America in the future," said Dr. Kenneth Watman, director of the Naval War College's War Gaming Department. "This event gave us the opportunity to provide an environment for the New York Police Department to better prepare their

top officials for this post-9/11 reality."

The professional war gamers from Newport held planning meetings with police officials to determine the scope and scale of the game.

These scenarios, according to Watman, were designed by members of the Naval War College War Gaming Department to give the NYPD a chance to

strengthen their current crisis management plans while using "outside of the box" thinking.

The Naval War College has been playing a significant role as the United States continues to place a new emphasis on homeland security. Recently, the War Gaming Department completed similar war games with the Rhode Island.



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Whats going on

Air Force Thunderbirds to headline R.I. Air Show

N O R T H KINGSTOWN - The skies over Narragansett Bay will rumble next weekend as the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds highlight the 11th annual R.I. National Guard Air Show and Open House. The show is free, but donations of \$5 for parking will be charged. Gates open at 9 a.m.

The Thunderbirds, the Air Force's crack flight demonstration team, will give two shows, June 29 and 30, at the Quonset Air National Guard Base.

Formed in 1953, the six F-16 Fighting Falcon Thunderbirds perform more than 60 performances annually. In addition, the Air Force will also feature the F-15 Eagle and the A-10 Thunderbolt II.

The F-15 Eagle is the primary tactical fighter for the Air Force. The A-10, affectionately known as the "Warthog," is the principal ground attack aircraft flown by the Air National Guard.

During the Persian Gulf war, the A-10 flew 8,100 sorties against Iraqi targets.

The U.S. Navy will feature the F-14 Tomcat, a supersonic fighter designed to attack and destroy enemy aircraft in all weather conditions, and at night. It is the world's premier air defense fighter.

Representing the Canadian armed forces, will be the Canadian version of the F/A-18 Hornet. The supersonic strike fighter, also flown by U.S. Navy and Marine Corps pilots, provides both fighter and attack capabilities. It has a top speed in excess of Mach 1.8.

Additional performers will include the U.S. Navy's SEAL parachute team the "Leap Frogs"; the British Army's para-

chute team, the "Red Devils"; Mike Goulian's CAP 232; Frank Ryder's Oreck XL; Gene Soucy's Bearcat Wingwalking; Les Shockley's 300 mph Shockwave jet turbine powered truck; Mike Mancuso's Extra 300L; and the powered hang-glider of Dan Buchanan.

Rhode Island National Guard units will simulate an aerial assault, with machine gun fire and rappelling from hovering helicopters.

Many aircraft will be displayed on the tarmac, including the huge C-130 Hercules and a C-5 Galaxy, an A-10 Warthog, an AH-64 Apache helicopter, and the UH-60 Blackhawk helicopter popularized in the movie, *Blackhawk Down*.

Families will also be able to enjoy the children's area located on the flight line.

The Quonset Air Museum will display vintage aircraft, and each unit from the R.I. National Guard will also display and explain their equipment.

The proceeds from the air show are donated to charities throughout Southern New England. The Hasbro Children's Hospital is the major benefactor, receiving over \$625,000 in the past eight years.

Because of safety and security considerations visitors should limit carry-on bags. All bags will be inspected by security personnel.

Doctor: My jaw hurts. What can I do?

Do you suffer from jaw pain? Do you wake up in the morning and your jaws feel stiff? Do you have neck pain and headaches? If you do you may fall into a population of people who suffer from orofacial pain/TMD.

Greater understanding of TMD has emphasized the need for a more thorough appreciation of the relationship between TMD and other pain disorders in the head and neck.

TMD is a collective term that includes a number of clinical problems that involve the chewing muscles, the temporomandibular joint (TMJ), or both.

According to the American Academy of Craniofacial Pain, health problems and the pain associated with disorders of the jaw joint (the TMJ) may seem to be mysterious and unexplainable to you.

There are growing numbers of health care providers who are qualified to diagnose and

treat Temporomandibular Joint Disorders (TMD).

While no amount of printed information can replace a complete examination by a qualified practitioner, it is often comforting to have some of your questions answered before taking that major step and making an appointment to consult "an expert."

Some patients live with TMD for years before it becomes painful enough to cause them to seek help.

Others contract the problem suddenly — usually by some trauma or blow to the head, face and/or neck region. But both types of patient can have very similar symptoms.

Even though a headache can be a sign of many kinds of health problems, frequent headaches are the most common complaints of TMD sufferers. vary from patient to patient and from office to office. Some problems may require a "team approach."



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

Sen. Pat Roberts, R-Kan., told the 641 graduates of the Naval War College, "the nation needs your leadership," during ceremonies last Friday on Dewey Field.

Roberts, the ranking member of the Emerging Threats and Capabilities Subcommittee, spoke about the global campaign against terrorism.

"Every American citizen is a combatant in this war" and "the military must reform" to meet this new generation of threats, he said.

Roberts also urged the graduates to take risks. He told the graduates that the "greatest hazard in life is to risk nothing."

Rear Adm. Rodney P. Rempt, President of the college, offered welcoming remarks to the graduating class and overflow crowd.

"A number of you will have the opportunity to use what you have

learned immediately," said Rempt. "As you leave Newport, you enter a world at war against terrorism. You will find that your services, your nations, and

your fellow officers will now look to you, as a graduate of this war college for enlightened leadership."

Rempt also pointed out a first in War

College's history: Of the 307 students from the College of Distance Education who completed the Naval

War College core curriculum, 17 achieved the requirements needed for a fully accredited master's degree. These students attended evening seminars at one of the college's 22 satellite campuses across the country.

In addition to the graduates of the College of Distance Learning, the Naval War College June Class of 2002 also includes 35 senior international officers in the Naval Command College; 128 senior officers and federal government civilians in the College of Naval Warfare; 45 mid-career U.S. officers and federal government civilians in the College of Naval Command and Staff; and 28 mid-career international officers in the Naval Staff College.

MIDDLETOWN — The Beatles sang, *Strawberry Fields Forever*, but the truth is the peak month for the juicy fruit is June when the crop is ripe for picking. By July the season has past.

NAVSTA unveils plans for 18-hole golf course

MIDDLETOWN — Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport last week announced preliminary plans to build an 18-hole golf course bordering Defense Highway from Middletown to Portsmouth.

The announcement was made by Capt. Ruth A. Cooper, NAVSTA Commanding Officer, at the regularly scheduled town coffee meeting at Naval Station Newport's headquarters in Building 690.

Newport, Middletown and Portsmouth town officials, and NAVSTA commanding and executive officers attended. The plans were also unveiled at the regular Restoration Advisory Board meeting with the Navy last Wednesday.

The \$12 million, championship-style golf course, would stretch from Tank Farm 4 at Carr Point to Tank Farm 2 at Melville and encompass up to 505 acres.

The 18-hole course would span 7,200 yards in a par 72 format with multiple tee boxes and generously sized greens, according to Cmdr. David Burnes, Public Works officer.

The idea of a course in this location has been discussed for some time, but actual environmental and project planning is only a few months along, though moving very quickly.

The Navy holds 1,503 acres of land along the west side of Narragansett Bay with an assessed value of \$1.5 billion.

The Aquidneck Island Planning Commission has looked at Navy property as a component of its West Side Master Plan. Public comment on preferred use for the land favors open space and recreational use, like this golf course concept, as opposed to commercial development.

Dick Phillips, Morale, Welfare and Recreation director,

said the golf course clubhouse and parking area, plus holes 17 and 18 would be on the water side of Burma Road at Carr Point. The remaining 16 holes would be on the east side of the road.

There are six golf courses on Aquidneck Island: Newport Country Club in Newport, Wanumetonomy Golf and Country Club in Middletown; and Carnegie Abbey, Green Valley, Montaup and Pocasset Country Clubs in Portsmouth.

Two other courses are being built on the Portsmouth and Middletown town lines along Mitchell's Lane. The first, Newport National Golf Club, is scheduled to open at the end of June. Construction on the second will begin this summer

and open in 2005.

Both of these courses as most of the other courses on the island, are private to semi-private type membership country clubs.

The proposed MWR Navy golf course would be restricted to Navy personnel, their dependents, retirees, Department of Defense civilian workers, and reserves. It could also be open to the public for special days, tournaments, and Commanding Officer invitations.

Besides the clubhouse and parking, the complex would include a restaurant, pro shop, and driving range. A walking trail around the perimeter of this property is another huge feature of in the project's concept.

The Navy wants to build not only a top flight golf course, but quality recreation area in harmony with nature.

The golf course would feature today's best practices in Integrated Pest Management, no mow zones for bird and small animal habitats, and environmentally responsible

development techniques designed to maximize water conservation and minimize construction impacts to the area.

The nature trail around the golf course would tie into the club house parking area and be accessible from the bike path or Burma Road.

The Navy will solicit only professional golf course designers and developers when the project is ready to be built.

The course would be built with nonappropriated funds from the Navy MWR Headquarters in Millington, Tenn. David Dorocz, the NAVSTA Environmental Department Head, said an environmental impact study is already awarded to a Naval Facilities contract consultant.

Construction will not start until probably 2004 and is hoped to be completed in June 2006.
