Repaving to close access to Gym 109

In a continuing effort to improve Naval Station Newport road conditions, several streets and parking lots will be closed for reconstruction this month, Lt. Chris Rehkop, assistant Public Works officer, has announced.

Asphalt reclamation equipment will be removing black-top so new surfaces may be laid before cold weather.

Meyerkord Avenue and Elliot and Kollmeyer Streets were stripped earlier this month in preparation for re-paving around Nimitz Field at the Naval Education and Training Center.

The next construction area is the Pier Two southern parking lot, and Knight Road and

Hampshire Drive that serve as access roads to Gym 109's parking lot. They will be closed from Oct. 23 to Nov. 2.

The next step will include the removal of the existing asphalt surface, Oct. 23-25; and the second phase will be re-paving and re-stripping from Oct. 28 to Nov. 2

Additionally, the parking lot on the west side of Gym 109 also will be closed from Oct. 28 to Nov. 2 for resurfacing and re-stripping.

In early November, Public Works will announce resurfacing and re-stripping for the northern Pier Two parking lot and the parking lots on the south and east sides of Gym 109, Lt. Rehkop said.

Open seminar helps officers find 2nd career after military

Transitioning from the military to the civilian workforce can be an overwhelming experience. Retired Col. H.W. "Buzz" Buse III, Deputy Director, Officer Placement Service for The Retired Officers Association (TROA), will head a seminar that will help ease some of the anxiety for employment.

The free 2 1/2 hour presentation, "Marketing Yourself for a Second Career," will be held Monday, Oct. 21, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. at Weakley Hall Auditorium, Surface Warfare Officers School Command.

The program is sponsored by The Retired Officers Association (TROA) Officer Placement Service.

All officers, senior non-commissioned officers, and their spouses are welcome and encouraged to attend.

A three-phase plan on conducting a job search; tips to strengthen your resume; networking; preparing for and conducting a successful interview; and how to negotiate salary are some of the topics that will be discussed.

Buse said the presentation

focuses on the transition "challenges" confronted by all officers and senior enlisted when they elect to leave the military.

All attendees will be offered two free publications — *Marketing Yourself for a Second Career* and *Financial Planning Guide*.

Buse's lecture is presented at more than 150 military installations worldwide each year, and is a "must attend" for those two to three years from retirement or separation.

Sewage plant offers odor-eating solution

Any morning when there's a southerly breeze, it greets commuters arriving at Naval Station Newport's Gate 4: the odor from the Newport sewage treatment plant on Connell Highway.

If the wind is straight from the east the odor impacts indoor air quality in Navy office spaces in NAVSTA Command Headquarters Building 690, the Main Post Office, the NAVSTA Fire Station and beyond.

For some enlisted members on gate duty during the hot muggy days of summer, the odor was nauseating.

The Housing Office in 1992 was forced to abandon six duplex housing units in the former Coddington Park behind the Post Office. The smell was so overpowering that some occupants became ill, and most kept their windows closed in summer.

The duplexes were finally demolished in 1993 under orders by then Commanding Officer, Capt. Norman Patarozi.

The only chance for clean air at the naval station comes with a northwesterly breeze.

"The odor was particularly bad last summer because some older equipment had to

be disassembled to install new equipment, and odor was released," said Newport deputy director of utilities Anthony Sylvia.

"We kept the Department of Environmental Management informed, and told them we were working as quickly as possible."

But next month the city believes it finally can clear the air. He said Earth Tech, a Concord, Mass., company that manages the city's sewer system, is installing a \$1.3 million system that will pipe the foul air from the plant through an "air scrubber."

The plant's holding and settling tanks are covered. The gases or vapors will then be vacuumed out of the tanks to a central tower where chemical treatment will rid them of odor-producing elements.

A spokesman for Earth Tech was not available for comment.

"Newport for years has tried to control the smell given off by the daily treatment of 8.4 million gallons of wastewater. The most recent attempt to mask was to spray a citrus-scented mist around the perimeter of the plant. That was ineffective, Sylvia said.

Will this new treatment work?

"I'm looking forward to it," he said.

What's going on

Historic document on display

The Rhode Island copy of the Declaration of Independence is currently at the Museum of Newport History at the Brick Market in Washington Square.

The so-called Newport-Southwick print of the West Greenwich Declaration of Independence was printed shortly after July 12, 1776, by a decree from the R.I. General Assembly.

Solomon Southwick, publisher of the Newport Mercury, made the print at his Washington Square printing house on the James Franklin printing press. James was Benjamin's brother.

The document can be viewed next to the printing press at the museum.

The document will be on public display today from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. and tomorrow, Oct. 19, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is free and open to the public.



Take a daily walk and help prevent osteoporosis

Osteoporosis is a disease that causes bones, especially in the hips, spine and wrists, to become so weak that they break.

TRICARE corner

This disease affects more than 10 million Americans. An alarming one out of two women and one out of eight men over age 50 will suffer a fracture related to osteoporosis during their lives.

Women are especially at risk if they have a family history of the disease, have gone

through menopause or have a small body frame.

As people age, the risk of osteoporosis increases because bone begins to break down and cannot be replaced as quickly. Smoking, too little exercise and a diet low in calcium and vitamin D increase the risk of osteoporosis. Fortunately, there are methods that lessen the chances of osteoporosis.

To help your body fight bone loss, eat a diet rich in calcium and vitamin D and get plenty of exercise. Dairy products, canned fish and dark green vegetables are great sources of calcium. Foods that are rich in vitamin D, such as eggs, fatty fish and cereal, help your body absorb calcium.

Walking is the best form of exercise for preventing osteo-

porosis. Remember to check with your doctor before beginning any new exercise plan or before changing your diet.




The guest speaker at the ball was Rear Adm. Rodney Rempt, President of the Naval War College. He





She relieved Rear Adm. Donald Arthur, Medical Corps, who assumed command at NNMC Bethesda on Oct. 4.

Navy to project U.S. sovereignty

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Vern Clark said the Navy will invest in a strategy that projects American sovereignty and gives the U.S. Armed Forces the freedom of international, operational independence.

"We must be able to operate out of the international domain where we don't need a permission slip — and that's either space or the oceans," Clark told a North Carolina business delegation on Capitol Hill. "We are capitalizing on our approach to maximize our advantage of being able to operate from sea bases where we are free to go as we please."

The CNO said the projection of sovereignty will continue to be a critical issue in the coming decades and that sea basing will provide the president with a range of military options.
