When the next wave of reservists deploys from Rhode Island in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, they'll hand deliver some precious cargo to service members already serving overseas: Armed Services YMCA care packages.

The initiative, the second annual Operation Valentines Drop, was coordinated by the ASYMCA staff. More than 70 shoe boxes decorated by the preschoolers were packed with various toiletries, magazines, post cards, candy and gum.

About 50 people attended a brief ceremony last Friday, where the boxes were presented to representatives of the Rhode Island Air and Army National Guards.

Accepting were Master Sgt. Richard Saritelli, Superintendent of the 143rd Air Wing Security Forces in Providence; Marcy Ward, Family

Readiness Program Coordinator for the Air National Guard at Quonset Point; and Master Sgt. Christopher Gilfillan of the 115th Military Police and State Family Program Coordinator for the R.I. Army National Guard. All said they were both proud and honored to be there.

The gifts will be transported with the support of the Rhode Island Chapter of the American Red Cross.

"We are thrilled to be a part of this," said retired Rear Adm. Barbara McGann, executive director of the Rhode Island Chapter of the American Red Cross. "As the single official link of communication between service members forward deployed around the world and their families, this is just one more medium that will boost the morale of the troops."

CNO offers his condolences to families of Columbia's crew

WASHINGTON (NNS) — The Chief of Naval Operations has offered his condolences to the families of three Navy astronauts who were among seven lost when the Space Shuttle Columbia disintegrated on reentering the earth's atmosphere last Saturday morning.

Debris from the shuttle has been found in a wide swath from central and east Texas to Louisiana.

"Today (Feb. 1) our Navy family mourns

the loss of three of our shipmates," said Adm. Vern Clark. "Capt. David Brown, Cmdr. Laurel Clark and Cmdr. William McCool dedicated themselves to a lifetime of service. Their sacrifice, commitment and passion for excellence are personal examples to all of their shipmates who are privileged to wear the cloth of our nation.

Brown and Clark, naval flight surgeons were mission specialists, and McCool was the shuttle's pilot. It was their first space flight.

19th century submarines 'remodeled'

Most men remember as kids building Revell plastic model airplanes and cars. Often, the pieces didn't quite fit, and needed shaving down. The room would fill with the vapors of clear modeling glue, and the runny modeling paint would wind up all over their fingers and the bedroom desk.

As they got older, the hobby was abandoned and the models were shelved in the closet or left to collect dust on the bureau.

Thomas McGoonan, 60, who works for Alterations and Specialized Trades at NAVSTA Public Works Dept.,

was no different. But now after 30 years he has found new interest in modeling, this time from scratch materials.

"Plastic is plastic," he said. "But with wood, it can be shaped and repaired if broken. And it's all painted, anyway, in

aluminum to the building materials.

A skilled maintenance mechanic, carpenter and retired Coast Guard boiler tender first class, McGoonan is especially drawn to early submarine designs — specifically those of 19th century naval architect John P. Holland. The Irish-American designed and constructed the Navy's first commissioned submarine, the USS Holland, and was a key innovator at the start of the "premodern" submarine era.

But what is most remarkable about Holland's designs from the late 1800s is that they resemble the Navy's concept designs of the 21st century.

Bong! Bong! Bong!
It's a sound all sailors recognize: a loud insistent gong sounding over the ship's 1MC (public address system).

Then, "General Quarters; General Quarters. All hands man your battle stations."

The sound causes the Officer Indoctrination School (OIS) Officers' adrenalin to flow as they switch into combat mode. The call to General Quarters (GQ) means they drop whatever they're doing, don their battle gear and sprint for their battle stations. Seconds count, and performing as a

team during moments of absolute chaos can determine the survival of ship and crew.

Naval warfare is serious business. The leadership at Officer Training Command Newport (OTCN) recognize that officers require exercises which are as real as they can possibly be. From this desire grew Battle Stations, the culminating event of OIS officer training in Newport. The benchmark in developing this training tool is the Battle Stations event pioneered at Recruit Training Center (RTC), Great Lakes.

The contribution of manpower and input from RTC was instrumental in the success of the development of this **BATTLE**, Page 9

first iteration of Battle Stations here in Newport last week. The exercise received security and medical support from Naval Station Newport and the Naval Ambulatory Care Center.

Battle Stations began at 7 p.m. on Jan. 29 with the sounding of GQ. The OIS students were just standing down from a full training day and had grown accustomed to regular GQ drills. They had no idea that this drill would last all night —12 hours.

OIS student Lt.j.g. John Shannon said the impromptu training was very challenging.

"Everything fell in line and we accomplished the tasks every time," said Shannon. "At each evolution, someone new had to step up and lead, and they did."

Once mustered in their respective repair lockers, the teams were ordered to egress the

building in response to a simulated missile attack. Once the missing individuals were identified, teams were dispatched to investigate the spaces and rescue their shipmates. When all members were accounted for, the event was debriefed and the teams were directed to the next event.

The balance of the evolution consisted of seven more events: Stores On-Load, Mass Casualty, Damage Control, Abandon Ship, Three Mile March, establishing a Combat Operations Center Tent, and Fire Fighting. Each event began with a brief that established the objective, the historical relevance and safety.

Real scenarios generated from the USS Indianapolis, Chosin Reservoir, USS Stark, USS Cole and other significant naval events were used to demonstrate to the officers the importance of being ready whenever emergencies occur. Each event lasted 75 minutes and was summarized by team assessment of leadership, teamwork, communication, chain of command and an open discussion as to the scenario's relevance to Navy Core

Values.

The inaugural Battle Stations event was successfully completed by 40 OIS officers and more than 30 OTCN Staff on Jan. 30 at

7 a.m.

Capt. Daniel Brennock, Commanding Officer, OTC Newport, congratulated OIS Class 03020 on being the first team of naval officers to meet the challenge.

He said the exercise exceeded his expectations.

"Up until now you were students," said Capt. Brennock. "Tonight you became officers. You have to take your training seriously, and last night you showed that you did."

The OTCN team was directed to enhance the rigor of the officer training program, and to build a more professional, prideful officer, and a better trained and tested leader to meet the needs of the U.S. Navy Fleet.

Capt. Brennock, who praised his staff for their coordination of the training, said that "Battle Stations" will be implemented into curriculum for students attending the Naval Chaplains School and the Naval Science Institute (NSI), as well as all future OIS classes.

patent drawings from National Archives, and turns them into three-dimensional models.

Before he focused on submarines, McGoonan built a 41-inch model of the Little Toot tugboat from the 1939 storybook; and a scale model cross section of the hull and superstructure of the 1917 steam schooner Edna Christenson.

McGoonan's first submarine model was a 1:24 scale replica of the USS Holland VI. He used half-inch plywood disks to make the hull's shape, then covered the form with basswood strips to simulate tempered steel plates.

The 26 1/2 inch model is cut-away amidships to show her engineering spaces and torpedoes.

The real USS Holland VI was built in Elizabethport, N.J., between 1896 and 1897 and was 53.3 feet long and could dive to 75

feet. She was tested with an all-volunteer crew in 1900 during the North Atlantic Squadron War Games off Newport.

McGoonan next researched and built a 15 1/2 inch long model of Holland's "Fenian Ram," now on display at the Sea, Air & Space Museum in New York City as part of the John P. Holland exhibit. Again, he used basswood to create the hull plating. But to duplicate the rough surface texture of the real boat, he dabbed on 5-minute epoxy with a stiff bristle brush.

"It came out looking like the real skin of the diving boat," he said.

The real Fenian Ram, at 31-feet, was launched in 1881 and financed by the Fenian Brotherhood, the American arm of the Irish Revolutionary Brotherhood struggling for political independence.

The sub is now at the Paterson, N.J., Museum.

McGoonan was particularly impressed with the sleek, futuristic designs of Holland's submerging and submergible torpedo boats before the USS Holland.

He built a 42 1/2-inch model of the 1897 Submergible Torpedo Boat "Plunger"; a 24-inch model of Holland's design in 1888 for a Submerging Torpedo Boat; and a 45-inch model of Holland's later design (1895) of an Armored Submerging Torpedo Boat, Mark-2.

The latter design looks remarkably like the DD-21 land attack destroyer that Navy considered a few years ago.

McGoonan's research into each submarine has been published in several journals, *the Nautical Research Journal* and *the SubCommittee Report*.



Joint Venture joins action

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (NNS) — The crew of experimental vessel Joint Venture (HSV-X1) has spent the last year honing their skills and testing the capability of their new platform.

The buzzwords surrounding the project were always “experimental” or “testing ground,” with ship and crew operating in a training-heavy, scenario-driven environment.

however, changed that. The Australian-built catamaran departed Naval Amphibious Base Little Creek Jan. 25 for its first operational deployment. The ship visited Newport, R.I. last year for the second time.

The aluminum-hulled Joint Venture boasts a fully operational flight deck and a completely computerized pilot-house, stocked entirely with commercial off-the-shelf technology.

It can carry as many as 400 troops and crew at speeds in excess of 40 knots and transport a number of different ground vehicles, small watercraft and equipment for use in any warfighting scenario.

DoD to handle ‘bio’ weapons

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs William Winkenwerder Jr. recently stated the U.S. military is prepared to protect its personnel against the use of biological weapons.

The department uses a range of measures to protect service members from biological threats, including combinations of protective clothing and equipment, detectors, vaccines, antibiotics and training.

“The Chemical Biological Defense Program’s initiatives over the last decade have significantly improved our ability to protect service members from the effects of biowarfare weapons. Our commanders on the battlefield today have the benefit of those improvements,” Winkenwerder said.

DoD’s protective measures are strongest against two significant biological threats:

anthrax and smallpox. DoD has supplies of anthrax and smallpox vaccines available to protect its at-risk forces.

“In addition to the vaccines against the most likely biological threats, anthrax and smallpox, DoD has other countermeasures to protect against biological threat agents,”

Winkenwerder said.

Troops to get IRS tax relief

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Military members serving in designated combat zones in support of the war against global terrorism will get a tax break from Uncle Sam.

Depending upon rank, eligible service members can exclude either all or some of their active-duty pay — and certain other pays — earned in any month during service in a designated combat zone from federal income tax.

According to the Internal Revenue Service’s Armed

Forces’ Tax Guide for 2002, “a combat zone is any area the President of the United States designates by Executive Order as an area in which the U.S. Armed Forces are engaging or have engaged in combat.”

The tax guide defines the qualifying areas.
