



# War College speaker says information is best weapon

The Director for Force Transformation for the Department of Defense said the war in Iraq showcased the value of tactical intelligence, or information, in gaining the strategic advantage.

Retired Vice Adm. Arthur Cebrowski, was the first of several featured speakers at the 54th Current Strategy Forum at the Naval War College this week. The theme was "U.S. Grand Strategy and Sea Power for the 21st Century."

The Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. Vern Clark, spoke on Wednesday.

The annual event brings together prominent defense

analysts, civilian and military leaders, NWC faculty, and senior U.S. and international military officers attending the college to explore major strategic issues.

Cebrowski, since he retired from the Navy and as president

of the War College in 2001, has been tasked with transforming the nation's military capabilities to ensure an overwhelming and continuing competitive advantage for decades to come.

# War College to graduate 782 today

NWC Public Affairs Office

Dr. Paul Wolfowitz, Deputy Secretary of Defense, will address the graduates of the Naval War College (NWC) during ceremonies on Dewey Field today at 10 a.m.

The graduating class represents 782 officers from the U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Army, and the U.S. Coast Guard, and civilians from various government agencies and countries. Many graduates will take high level assignments in command of ships or squadrons, or as members of strategic planning staffs.

Graduates receive master of arts degrees in National Security and Strategic Studies as accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

President Bush nominated Wolfowitz in February 2001 to be Deputy Secretary of Defense. He was unanimously confirmed by the Senate, and sworn in March 2, 2001.

This is Dr. Wolfowitz's third tour of duty in the Pentagon.

## Motorcyclists should observe traffic 'code of conduct,' too

Just like all naval personnel follow standards of behavior during duty hours, motorcycle riders are expected to observe a code of conduct while operating their bikes off-duty. The Navy requires motorcycle riders to obey operational and protective equipment requirements, along with standards of conduct.

- Operational requirements:**
- Headlights must be on
  - Vehicle must have rear-view mirrors.
- Required personal protective equipment:**
- Properly fastened protective helmet
  - Properly worn eye-protective device
  - Sturdy footwear
  - Long-sleeved shirt or jacket
  - Long-legged trousers
  - Full-fingered gloves
  - Brightly colored or contrasting vest or jacket as an upper garment during the day



and a reflective garment during the night.

**Standards of conduct:**

- Obey the posted speed limits at all times
- Drive according to road and weather conditions
- Accomplish mandatory training
- Maintain proper bearing and behavior
- Never attempt to operate the motorcycle beyond your or its capabilities
- Never operate a vehicle while intoxicated
- Never let anyone ride your motorcycle who is not properly trained.

Whenever you ride always wear your proper riding gear

which includes a helmet (DOT approved or better), eye protection (face shield, goggles or shatter resistant full coverage glasses), long sleeved shirt or jacket, full fingered gloves, long pants (denim or leather), and over the ankle boots or sturdy shoes with non skid soles.

emphasize speed and agility, he said. He has looked at radical ship hull designs, floating airstrips, stealth aircraft, vertical launch air transports, lasers and satellites weapons, unmanned aerial and surface drones, high speed platforms for special forces, and even airships for reconnaissance.

Cebrowski is a strong advocate of "network-centric warfare," where he believes tactical information from computer systems is as much a weapon for the warfighter on the front lines as his M-16 or battle tank.

"When the Marines first landed in Iraq they were issued "lip mikes" for direct communications," Cebrowski said. "At first they didn't want them, now if you try to take them away, they'll kill you."

He said it used to be that one good Army scout could serve

100 soldiers. Now you'd like 100 scouts for one GI, or an "intelligence-surveillance based force."

In a highly technical presentation called, "The Path Not Taken...Yet," Cebrowski divided the transformation task into three parts: The Role of Defense in National Security, The Management of Defense, and The Force.

He said the United States in the mid to late-1900s had good balance between its global interests and homeland security, but at the end of the Cold War the national security side "went on holiday."

Sept. 11 brought us back from vacation, he said. The information age has so saturated the industrialized world that the World Trade Center incident, like a rock thrown in a pond, sent ripples immediately around the world.

That "vertical shock" created "tails" that affected the airline industry, the economy and financial markets; and produced an anthrax scare and spurred the invasion of Afghanistan to find the terrorist bin Laden.

He said globalization has divided the world into a half-dozen "core" countries or geographic regions that are linked with well-developed markets. But those countries that cannot connect, or will not accept globalization, are the "hot spots" consistently attracting U.S. military attention.

These "have-not" nations are in Africa, the Balkans, the Middle East, and parts of South America. North Korea, isolated and politically dysfunctional, is also included.

"This 'Non-Integrating Gap' draws 95 percent of U.S. response activity," he said.

# Skills applied on links can keep life on par, too

Sometimes we find inspiration in unexpected places.

The February issue of *Golf* magazine lay on the break room table. While I was waiting for the microwave to heat

my lunch, I was flipping through the pages when I saw a short article by golf instructor Patti McGowan called "Focus for Pressure Putts."

Now, I am not really a golfer, but what she said about putting made sense to me. What captured my imagination was that what she said about golf made sense for day-to-day living, as well. All of us face situations every day in our relationships and interactions with others that can have consequences that will stay with us for a long time. And very often it is the little things that count.

"You'll always have your share of pressure putts," Patti McGowan said. "How well you handle them could be the difference between an average score and a career best — or worst."

Then she gave three tips:

First, "Stay in the present." She says to avoid "back-packing" and "future-tripping."

I like to call it the "coulda-woulda-should game" and just plain worry. It is one thing to learn from our mistakes in the past, but it is quite another to dwell on them, and obsess about all the things we could have said, or should have done.

We can't change the past, nor can we control the future, no matter how much we worry about it. We need to stay in the present, and do the best we can in the here and now.

McGowan's second tip is to "Think only positive thoughts." Our expectations can have a big impact in our lives. If we expect to see the worst in our partner, for example, very often that is what we will perceive.

"Imagine hearing the ball dropping in the cup." Think about how you want your relationship to be, or think about where you want to be in your career. And then make sure

the words you say or the things you do each day are consistent with your goals.

McGowan's last tip is "make a decisive stroke." I thought of commitment when I was read-

ing the article. Being committed means knowing what the right thing to do is, and then doing it!

Don't second-guess yourself. From what I know about golf,

there are too many things going on during a swing, for example, to be able to pay attention to each little step individually. You work on the fundamentals, and then you

just have to let your swing happen.

It is much the same in life. Our character is the result of all the little things we do during our lives.

PROVIDENCE — The pilots of the Blue Angels, the flight demonstration squadron of the United States Navy, will visit hospitalized veterans at the VA Medical Center on June 27.

The Blue Angels will be in Rhode Island for the annual R.I. Air National Guard Air Show at Quonset Point, held this year on June 28 and June 29.

At the end of World War II, the Chief of Naval Operations ordered the formation of a flight demonstration team to keep the public inter-

ested in naval aviation. The Blue Angels performed their first flight demonstration less than a year later in June 1946 at their home base, Naval Air Station (NAS) Jacksonville, Fla.

Since then, the Blue Angels have flown for more than 260 million spectators.

This will be the first time the Blue Angels have visited the VA medical center.







# 'Tiger cruise' begins here

Holding red, white and blue banners, family members and friends stood on Pier Two last week, constantly glancing at their watches waiting for the amphibious command and control ship USS Mount Whitney.

The 640-foot Mount Whitney is the Flagship for Commander, Second Fleet/Commander Striking Fleet Atlantic and is considered the most highly sophisticated Control, Command, Communications, Computer and Intelligence (C4I) ship yet commissioned, and is homeported in Norfolk, Va. The 32-year-old ship is commanded by Capt. David Prothero and carries a crew of 52 officers and 790 enlisted members.

The ship, returning from a seven month deployment in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, stopped in Newport to embark over 100 family members for a "tiger cruise" to Norfolk. Tiger cruises offer relatives and friends the chance to reunite and experience life at sea, and usually occurs during the last leg of a major overseas deployment.

The Mount Whitney left Norfolk last Nov. 12, and embarked 1,300 Marines from the 2nd Marine Division and II Marine Expeditionary Force at Morehead City, N.C.

As headquarters for Joint Task Force Horn of Africa (JTFHOA), its mission was to identify and confront terrorist activity in East Africa.

While waiting for the ship to arrive, the adults played cards, read books and mingled, while children played *Twister*, watched television and listened to music in the Fleet Operations building. Chocolate chip cookies and coffee were well received.

Jackie Russeau of Dorchester, N. H., has not seen her son, Elec-

trician's Mate Second Class Jeffrey Russeau, since late October, and has been assisting his fiancée with wedding plans while he was away.

"My son gets the best of both worlds," she said. "He can see us here, and his fiancée is meeting him in Virginia."

Several other family members who held a banner accompanied her. "I'm so excited to see my baby boy, I just thank God every day," she said.

John Troyanos of Phoenix, Ariz., hadn't seen his son, Lt. Jerry Troyanos, for four years.

"I can't wait for him to be home, so I can say, 'great job,' and remind him that while their supporting us, we're supporting them."

Senior Chief Cryptologic Technician (Communication) Nancy Hobart, reunited with her son, Don Utley of Virginia Beach said,

"It's an awesome, warm felt feeling seeing your family. I'm speechless."

Mess Management Specialist Second Class Danielle Webb, who enlisted at age 17, had to have her mother sign her paperwork at the recruiter's office. Her mother was waiting anxiously on the pier.

"I have no regrets for my daughter; she has grown so much," said Vernishu Stewart of Due West, S.C. "It is also not often you get to see the military at work."

After nearly all family and friends were reunited and went aboard ship, one family of about eight remained on the pier holding a large banner that read, "LTJG Justin J. Willis...Welcome Home." With a confused look on his face, the officer's father, Bob Willis, said jokingly, "I hope





Because of anti-American sentiment stemming from the war in Iraq, the Sailors had less than 20 days liberty. Brief ports of call were Rota and Palma, Spain; Valletta, Malta; and Victoria, Seychelles and Lisbon, Portugal.

Of the 213-day deployment there were 115 consecutive days at sea.

### Blue Jays draft Annapolis lefty

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Major League baseball's Toronto Blue Jays selected 2003 Naval Academy graduate Matt Foster in the 13th round of the 2003 First Year Player Draft June 3 in New York.

With a fastball in the mid-90 mph range, a changeup, a breaking ball and the fact that Foster is a lefty, the baseball world had a close eye on the Ventura, Calif., native.

Foster was the 380th pick out of 1,474 and is the first baseball player in the academy's history ever to be drafted by a professional team.

At Navy, Foster compiled a 13 and 11 record, striking out 121 batters and walked only 34 in 151 innings. Foster established a 3.75 earned run average and completed seven of the 27 games he started.

### USNS Comfort back from Iraq

ABOARD USNS COMFORT, At Sea (NNS) — Navy hospital ship USNS Comfort (T-AH 20) returned home to Baltimore from the Arabian Gulf June 12, ending a rapidly-begun, five-

month mission in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF).


Canton Pier was full of families and loved ones who welcomed about 320 military medical and support personnel, predominantly from the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md., and about 60 civil service mariners from the Navy's Military Sealift Command (MSC), headquartered in Washington, D.C.

The 894-foot ship, with its 1,000-bed medical treatment facility and 12 operating rooms, is one of two Navy hospital ships ordinarily kept pier-side in reduced operating status, ready to support combat or humanitarian operations.

Comfort and her West Coast sister ship USNS Mercy (T-AH 19) are mobilization resources for U.S. military forces, able to be activated, crewed by about 60 civilian mariners, staffed by up to about 1,200 military medical personnel and underway in a matter of a few days when duty calls. Comfort was activated Dec. 26 and departed Baltimore Jan. 6.

Comfort had 300 military medical and support personnel embarked when its OIF voyage began.
