7,000 Navy ships logged on museum's database

Active duty and retired Navy Sailors, who reminisce about sea duty, now have a resource to track their former ships.

The U.S. Navy 20th Century Ships History Database is now on line at the Naval War College Museum. Portsmouth native Mike Cardin, an employee in the Information Resource Development Department at the Naval War College, spearheaded the project.

"It all started about 1976 when my father brought the 1974-75 edition of *Jane's Fighting Ships* book home," said Cardin, who was 6 years old. "I was fascinated with it."

Cardin, who now lives in North Kingstown, said the 1,200-page book contained all aspects of naval ships including pictures, different types of ships, how long and fast they were, the weapons they carried and capabilities, crew capacity, even how they were named.

Every year after, Cardin read *Jane's Fighting Ships* cover to cover. "By the time I was 12, I could just about name any ship given a hull number and a view."

Close to 7,000 ships that served during this time period — carriers, battleships, cruisers, destroyers, frigates, amphibious ships, submarines, patrol craft and PT boats — are included in the database.

The database, which includes all Navy vessels from 1920 to the present, is accessible from a kiosk on the first floor.

Information can be called up by fleet roster, hull number, class, homeport, commissioning date, or where it was built.

It's also accessible through the Internet at www.nwc.navy.mil/usnhdb.

Cardin did a three-year tour the Marine Corps after high school and started college courses while stationed at Kings Bay, Ga. He continued his education at the University of Florida, receiving a degree in Decision Information Science in 1997.

Returning to Rhode Island, Cardin worked for several military contractors before coming

to work for the Naval War College.

Museum curator Bob Cembrola said veterans, especially from World War II, visit the museum and ask for information about ships and battles.

"I was constantly researching information in the *Dictionary of American Fighting Ships* and then making copies for them to keep," said Cembrola. "Now they are able to look it up themselves and print it out."

As long as the Navy keeps building new ships, the database will be updated, Cardin said.

Pier One open to view carriers

Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport will salute Armed Forces Day, May 17, by opening Pier One to the public tomorrow from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The public may view the inactive aircraft carriers Forrestal and Saratoga from the 1,500-foot pier in Coddington Cove.

The ships will not be open for tours, but visitors will be allowed to walk the length of the pier, rain or shine, to view these historic ships.

Meanwhile, the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Department will have an Armed Forces Day Kids Run on Saturday at 10 a.m.

This event is open to all authorized children ages 5 to 13. Children ages 5 to 6 will run a half-mile course; ages 7

to 8 will participate in a one-mile run; and ages 9 to 13 will run two miles. The courses begin at Lawrence Field, near Gate 1. The first 85 entries will receive a t-shirt.

Fort Adams Opening Day also will be Saturday at 10 a.m. The theme for this year's program is "Honor Our Military." The events will include military equipment exhibits, static displays, Armed Forces Day ceremonies and guided tours.

A Marine Corps drill instructor from the Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training (BOOST)/STA-21 Program will run the "Kids Boot Camp."

The Naval War College Museum will provide a display of historic model Navy ships.

Navy Band Northeast's Showband will play some favorite patriotic music at 2 p.m.

Former Vietnam POW to reflect on captivity

Professor Porter Halyburton of the Naval War College, a former POW in Vietnam for almost 7 1/2 years, will speak at the next Contemporary Civilization Lecture at Spruance Hall on May 21, at 7:30 p.m.

Halyburton is the assistant director for Innovation and Technology, as well as Head, Electives Division, for the College of Distance Education. He

will speak on "Reflections on Captivity."

Halyburton, a naval flight officer with his Squadron VF-84, flew off the aircraft carrier USS Independence in October 1964. He was shot down over North Vietnam, and originally listed as Killed in Action for 18 months. He was eventually released in February 1973.



SWOS project reaching new heights

After weathering a harsh winter and other contract issues, construction of the Surface Warfare Officers School Command's (SWOSCOLCOM) new Applied Instruction Building is back on track and headed for a first quarter of 2004 opening.

Robert Hymel, project engineer for prime contractor Triton Marine Construction Corp., said the \$13.5 million project is about 30 percent complete.

Groundbreaking for the three story, L-shape brick building behind Arleigh Burke Hall was in August 2002. When completed it will house the Division Officer School, currently in Callaghan Hall on Coddington Point.

Subcontractors CAPCO of Providence is installing the steel framing and Fernandez Masonry of Rhode Island is laying the brick and concrete. The subcontractors are hired by The Haskell Company of Jacksonville, Fla. Electricians and plumbers are also on the site. A towering 200-ton capacity crane on the site can be seen from most any point on Naval Station (NAVSTA) New-

port.

"This past winter, right from November on, was so bad we just shut down for 45 days," Hymel said. "But since March 17 we've put about 8,000 man hours into the job. To date, we've logged 14,800 man hours."

The building will provide classrooms, bridge and combat information center (CIC) simulators, tactical trainers, a cafeteria, department staff offices, an instructor bay, administration offices, plus staff and student lounges.

Heating will be solely by natural gas, and the pipeline is expected by August. Haskell is also contracted for parking and landscaping in the area.

"One of the more interesting aspects will be a glass skywalk from the second deck to the back of Arleigh Burke," he said.

The building's footprint sits on the site of the former Navy Brig, which created another problem. The remains of the brig had to be excavated before secure footings for the new building were poured. The deeper excavation created a surplus of soil for disposal.

Commanding Officer, NAVSTA, agreed to have the soil trucked to the large parking lot on Coddington Point.

The building is being erected

under a design-to-build contract, which allows the Navy to slightly modify the interior configurations or wiring during phases of construction.

Representatives from the Resident Officer in Charge of Construction (ROICC) office meet with the contractor every two weeks to review work schedules, products, minor design changes, and other issues.



War College to remember Battle of Midway



Last July, the Naval Academy Preparatory School (NAPS) accepted 337 new officer candidates to the fourth oldest school in the Navy.

The 10-month program prepares outstanding high school graduates and a select number of enlisted Navy and Marine Corps fleet personnel to enter one of the nation's three sea service academies—the U.S. Naval Academy, the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, and the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy.

That preparation culminates today at 10 a.m. when NAPS Class of 2003 graduates in ceremonies in Capt. Howard Kay Hall at Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport. Sen. Jack Reed, D-R.I., will be the guest speaker.

A typical day at NAPS begins at 6 a.m. and ends just before 11 p.m. The

intense college-level curriculum includes mathematics, physics, chemistry, English composition, and information technology.

Outside the classroom, students develop and hone military/leadership skills, undergo rigorous physical readiness training, and participate in a variety of varsity athletic programs.

Candidates can compete in football, basketball, baseball, tennis, wrestling, soccer, track and field, or volleyball against other prep schools and junior varsity squads at major colleges and universities in and around the New England area.

This year, NAPSters performed at one of the highest athletic levels in its 86-year history. The coed soccer team went undefeated at 10-0-1, the women's volleyball team ran up its best 10-1 record, and the football team posted an 8-2 season.

The track and field squad competed against Division I and Division III pro-

grams at the Penn Relays and took a silver medal. Baseball had a 7-6 season, but had a team batting average of .342.

The wrestling team posted an 8-1 record (its only loss to Army Prep) and played in three prestigious tournaments. The lacrosse team had a 6-5 season, and its highlight was beating both West Point junior varsity and and Military Academy Prep School.

The 264 NAPS graduates will report to the academies in late June to begin an additional four years of intensive study. Upon the successful completion of this five-year training program, they will receive commissions as officers in their respective sea services.





The 4x400m relay team, with leadoff man Coast Guard Cadet Candidate Rob O'Donnell, Midshipman Candidates Thompson and Hunter Reddick, and anchor man Levinson, won the silver medal finishing with a team record time of 3:26.96 behind winner Sidwell Friends of Washington, D.C. (3:23.86).

The second-place finish (out of 15 total teams) avenged a previous loss to Military Academy Prep School, along with teams from various prep schools in New Jersey, New York, Virginia and Maryland.



This cycle marks the first installment of promotions that contribute to the fiscal year 2004 Top Six increase to 73.25 percent of the active force serving in pay grades E-4 to E-9. The CNO’s goal is to grow the Top Six to 75.5 percent of the fleet by fiscal year 2007.

Conn. Seabees coming home

GROTON, Conn. (NNS) — The first contingent of Seabees from Construction Battalion Unit (CBU) 414 deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, returned home May 6 to the waiting arms of family and friends. The unit, stationed at Naval Submarine Base New London, had eleven of its nearly 40 members deployed to the Middle East in February.

The Seabees provided repair assistance within the camp and ensured Navy Fleet Hospital 15 equipment was maintained and in a continuous ready status. They also provided transportation for Fleet Hospital 15 personnel.

Aussies join FBE-Kilo here

NEWPORT, R.I. (NNS) — The Royal Australian Navy (RAN) and Australia’s Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO) are participating as coalition partners with the U.S. Navy in this year’s Fleet Battle Experiment (FBE)-Kilo..

FBE-Kilo, developed and executed by the Navy Warfare Development Command (NWDC) in Newport, is a three-week joint war fighting experiment, bringing together live field forces and computer simulations at various locations in the United States and the Pacific.

Coalition partners are participating in one of eleven experimental initiatives being

examined during FBE-Kilo. The Joint Fires Initiative implements a mix of both prototypes and current Navy systems and processes, to improve the execution of time sensitive targeting. It employs a sensor-to-shooter fires network using simulated and experimental platforms.

USNS Comfort trims back staff

ABOARD USNS COMFORT, At Sea (NNS) — In the northern Arabian Gulf, nearly 480 of USNS Comfort (T-AH 20) medical staff have headed for home after treating nearly 330 inpatients and about 300 outpa-

tients in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF). The return of medical staff to their stateside medical centers, clinics and other commands, comes as the hospital ship is given orders to reduce from its maximum 1,000-bed capacity to the 250 hospital-bed level.
