Current Strategy Forum to include CNO, senator

The Chief of Naval Operations and a former President of the Naval War College will be among guest speakers at the 54th Current Strategy Forum at the NWC on June 17-18. The theme for this year's forum is "U.S. Grand Strategy and Sea Power for the 21st Century."

Adm. Vern Clark, the Navy's highest-ranking uniformed officer, will speak June 18; and Vice Adm. Arthur Cebrowski, Director, Office of Force Transformation and former college president, will speak June 17.

This annual event brings together prominent defense analysts, civilian and military leaders, NWC faculty, and senior U.S. and international military officers attending the College to explore major strategic issues.

The forum will address the evolving security environment and U.S. grand strategy, redefining American military power, and implications for transforming maritime forces.

The forum has its origins in round table discussions first held at the NWC in May 1949. Their purpose then, as now, was to bring together prominent civilian and military leaders to discuss future U.S. strategy with senior officers at NWC.

Rear Adm. Rodney P. Rempt, NWC President, will open the forum on Tuesday morning, followed by an address by Sen. Jeff Sessions, R-Ala., a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

An afternoon panel discussion on "U.S. Grand Strategy:

What Should the U.S. Do with Primacy?" will include moderator Dr. Alberto R. Coll, dean, Center for Naval Warfare Studies; and Panelists Dr. Stephen M. Walt, Harvard University; Dr. Andrew Bacevich, Boston University; Dr. Josef Joffe, editor, *Die Zeit*; and Dr. Lawrence Freedman, King's College.

Rear Adm. Cebrowski will speak after lunch on, "The Path Not Taken...Yet."

An afternoon panel will focus on "U.S. Military Forces for the Future," with moderator Dr. Kenneth Watman, chairman, War Gaming Department; and panelists Vice Adm. Kevin P. Green, U.S. Navy, N3/N5, Plans, Policy &

Natural gas heating contracted for CHI

By the end of next year, Coasters' Harbor Island will be severed from the "silver snake."

Under a Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport basewide energy saving project that began in 1999, New England Gas Co. will extend gas lines across the island to convert the heating system from central steam to natural gas and oil fired boilers.

James Carlson, mechanical engineer at the NAVSTA Public Works Dept. said the natural gas distribution system project should begin in early July and take 90 to 120 days to complete. It is under the Naval Facilities Engineering Command supervision.

The upgrade is expected to save hundreds of thousands of dollars in heating costs over the next 10 to 20 years.

Currently, the island is heated by an above ground steam line, nicknamed the "silver

snake." The line runs from Building 7 near Gate 11, around Coddington Cove and Coddington Point, and across the CHI Pedestrian Bridge. It is then fed underground.

The steam lines are at least 15 to 20 years old, and some date back to World War II, Carlson said. A percentage of heat is lost through poor insulation in the journey.

"Some of the steam line trenches flood during heavy rain, and that wets the insulation, making it less effective," he said.

New England Gas will begin at Perry Road and Luce Avenue to excavate about two miles of roadway. There will be short duration detours and outages throughout the summer and fall.

The second phase of the project is the installation of about 40 natural gas fired boilers in all buildings or cluster of buildings. The target date for completion is December 2004.

Carlson said this will be a much more efficient system.

Four make a run for Megan's life

What would inspire someone to run across an entire state? Physical challenge? Limelight notoriety? Grand prizes?

How about Megan Hayward, a 7-year-old with cherub cheeks and bouncy pony tails waiting at the finish line. Megan is also a liver cancer patient.

Four Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training (BOOST) program students recently joined forces to help Megan by competing in

the third annual Rhode Island Border to Border Relay Race.

While medical teams at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Md., and at Hasbro Children's Hospital in Providence, R.I., help Megan medically, an annual gathering of runners do their part to raise awareness — and sponsorship funds — for her and other children coping with serious diseases.

Petty Officers Jason R. Chamberlain, Michael J. Michelli, James M. Bishoff and Paul J. Kaufman, along with civilian Torri Rienks, traversed more than 30 miles across

Rhode Island on May 3 as the Navy (Seaman-to-Admiral) team. They finished with a time of 3:37:35, capturing second place.

It was an impressive accomplishment, considering their competitors raced with a full complement of eight team members.

The race is divided into eight legs, varying in length from 2.1 to 5.1 miles and covering diverse terrain. Michelli, Bishoff and Kaufman each took an extra leg.

“Senior Chief (Michael) Demers prepared us enough

through daily PT,” said Kaufman, 21, of Roberts, Mont.

With their bodies in top shape, team members also drew from personal experiences to keep their minds focused on the benefit relay.

Chamberlain, 27, of Brighton, Mich., is particularly interested in supporting cancer research. His mother is recovering from cancer and his aunt has colon cancer, and he

NUWC photo included in 24-hour documentary

Last Oct. 22 just after midnight, 125 of the country's leading photojournalists launched an unprecedented mission: to record "A Day in the Life of the United States Armed Forces."

For 24 hours, this team documented the lives of elite units and freshly minted recruits; of cadets, generals, chaplains, medics and MPs; of personnel at desolate outposts, on strategic bases, and in the cockpits of fighter planes.

On that day, Air Force Master Sgt. Lance Cheung, attached to Headquarters, USAF News Agency, San Antonio, Texas, was in Newport to photograph the day's happenings at local Navy activities.

In all, 200,000 photos were taken by the photographers, and 250 photos were selected for inclusion in the book, *A*

Day In The Life of the United States Armed Forces.

The new book, which has been featured on *ABC News* and in the *U.S. News & World Report*, includes a photo taken by Cheung at the Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) Division Newport's Radio Frequency (RF) Tapered Anechoic Chamber.

The photo features NUWC engineer Pietro Porco of Middletown, making adjustments to an antenna in the 30 by 30 by 100-foot chamber prior to a test.



Children skip school, but spend day on job

In Water Pollution Awareness in Building 1219, children were brought up to speed on the different kinds of water pollution. Engineers Tom Cook and Lee Hall, who led the demonstration, said there was water pollution here at NUWC.

But Cook explained what is being done to fix the problem, and how expensive it can be. To demonstrate, they showed a model of a town sitting atop an aquifer. The children could see where the pollution came from.

Explained by Jeremy Shattock and Michael Umehara, Periscope Imaging in Building 1319 attracted a large crowd. Complete with periscope parts, a toy periscope, a video, and a touch screen children had a lot to keep them





by TRICARE should seek treatment at the nearest emergency room right away if care is needed to safeguard life, limb or eyesight.

If you're a TRICARE Prime enrollee and use a civilian emergency room you must notify Sierra Military Health Services within 24 hours. In addition, any follow-up care related to the visit must be scheduled with your Primary Care Manager.

If you are not sure if it is an emergency, you may call the Nurse Advice Line to help you decide. A registered nurse will give you basic medical information to help resolve the problem or, if necessary, direct you to the duty doctor, clinic, or nearest emergency department.

The Nurse Advice Line is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week to all beneficiaries. If the OPTUM Nurse Advice Line refers you to an emergency room, you should still contact Sierra.



Underage drinking concern for Navy

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) — An inordinate proportion of alcohol-related incidents in the Navy involve underage Sailors. In fiscal year 2002 underage Sailors accounted for 13.4 percent of personnel but they were involved in 31.2 percent of alcohol incidents. The majority of these incidents occur within the first two years of active duty service.

Navy Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention (NADAP) program managers at Navy Personnel Command (PERS-6), have received several Administrative Separation waiver requests due to alcohol-related incidents.

Upon review of the waiver request, a pattern usually emerges. A Sailor will incur an incident of underage drinking resulting in Non-Judicial Punishment (NJP) with the member being sent to treatment. Within six-months of treatment, the member will incur a more serious incident in conjunction with underage drinking.

During this time the Sailor will incur a few days of unauthorized absences (UA). Although, not documented as alcohol-related incidents, UAs are often associated with alcohol abuse. The individual again, goes to NJP for the incident and UAs. They are sent to

treatment a second time, and history has shown that the Sailor will usually incur a third incident.

The majority of these underage members have only about 18 months of active service. During their first 18 months of active duty, the member may have incurred two to three alcohol-related incidents, attended treatment, awarded restriction, and continues to ignore the consequences of their behavior.

Only when the commanding officer submits a request for waiver does the Sailor realize that this behavior will not be tolerated and that they could soon be separated from the Navy. The majority of these types of waivers are not recommended for approval.

Civil War crew to 'rest in peace'

WASHINGTON (NNS) — "We will soon witness one of the great historical events of our lifetime."

Nearly 140 years ago, Feb. 17, 1864, a volunteer crew of eight men entered the experimental vessel with the mission of sinking the USS Housatonic. After ramming a spar torpedo into the hull of Housatonic, exploding it and sinking the vessel in a matter of minutes, the Hunley began her journey home.
