The Chief of Naval Operations called on the allied nations of the world to form a maritime partnership of navies and coast guards to defeat terrorism "where ever it may fester."

## New technologies bridge barriers to the disabled

What looked like a technology fair last week at the Officers' Club was actually a unified presentation of resources available to the disabled for employment, education and improved quality of life.

October is Disability Awareness Month. In observance, the Naval Station Newport Equal Employment Opportunity Committee (EEOC) hosted its third annual Disability Awareness Fair. More than 300 people attended and 60 exhibitors participated.

Principal speaker was Robert Gearing, a consultant to Cote & D'Ambrosio. It is a Wickford-based marketing, advertising and public relations agency hired by the Rhodes to Independence Steering Committee to launch a public awareness campaign to increase work opportunities for Rhode Islanders with disabilities.

Wheelchair-bound as a result of an automobile accident at age 18, Gearing knows

all too well the obstacles the disabled face.

"I was still the same person, but those who knew me treated me differently," said Gearing, who had plans to join the Navy at the time of his accident. "The Navy was no longer an option."

## Take safety along Halloween night

By following a few simple safety measures, parents can help ensure Halloween will be a memorable treat for their young trick-or-treaters tonight.

Door-to-door trick-or-treating is authorized in Navy Newport Housing areas from 5 to 8 p.m. only. A 10 p.m. curfew will be in effect for all youth under age 18.

Some good safety tips to follow include:

- Wear bright colored costumes and use face make-up

instead of masks.

- Use make-up instead of masks to ensure optimum visibility.

- Costumes should be altered to prevent the possibility of tripping or falling.

- Carry a flashlight so you will be seen in poorly lit areas.

- Young trick-or-treaters should be accompanied by an adult at all times.

- Older children should never go out alone, stay with their group and never enter the homes of strangers.

- Walk on sidewalks. When not possible, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic.

## Muslims begin fasting as Ramadan observed

Oct. 27 marked the beginning of Ramadan, a month-long religious event when nearly 1.5 billion Muslims around the world fast as a practice of self-control, inner reflection, and increased devotion to God.

The primary goal of Ramadan is to engage in intensive worship, read the *Qur'an* (the Muslims' Holy Book), provide charity to those in need, and purify one's behavior.

Through fasting, Muslims will achieve a measure of ascendency to their spiritual nature while becoming closer to God through a loss of preoc-

cupation with the satisfaction of eating during daylight hours. In addition, Muslims view fasting as a way of developing sympathy for the less fortunate, and learning to be thankful and show appreciation.

Fasting begins at the break of dawn and ends at sunset. Participants are required to abstain from eating, drinking, smoking during daylight hours throughout the month of worship.

Over 2 million Muslims will gather in Mecca, Saudi Arabia, to spend the last 10 days of Ramadan in prayer at the Grand Mosque-The Kabah. Ramadan ends on Nov. 25.

## Judge says terrorism began with Marines killed in Beirut

PORTSMOUTH — Rhode Island Supreme Court Chief Justice Frank Williams said the war on terrorism began with the Beirut Marine barracks bombing in 1983, but there was no reaction on the political front.

“Things did not get better in our political culture, and I’m angry about that. It’s not good for a judge to be angry,” Williams said. “Had we taken



action after Beirut do you think Sept. 11 would have occurred?”

Williams was an unexpected guest speaker on Oct. 23 at the 20th annual memorial services at the Portsmouth Beirut Marine Memorial at the Portsmouth Historical Society. The program, moved indoors because of weather, specifically honors nine Rhode Island Marines who were among 241 killed in October 1983.

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

The Naval Academy Prep School (NAPS) Rams remained undefeated on their home turf this past weekend as they defeated the Bridgton Academy Wolverines, 34-18, in a hard fought football classic.

The Wolverines managed to pound away on the ground early in the game behind their powerful tailback, Maurice Murray. Down 12-6 at the half, the Rams rallied in the second half to come out victorious.

NAPS Quarterbacks Troy Goss and Anthony Johnson led the offense with a combined three touchdowns on the day. Running back Joe Gonzalez added another touchdown

while his counterpart Drew Johnson managed to average 10 yards per run on the day.

In addition, Rams wide receiver O.J. Washington had three catches for 75 yards and fullback Adam Ballard added 81 yards on the ground, positioning him right below the 1,000 yard running mark for the season.

The Navy defense did its part to stop the Wolverines' offense as linebacker Noah Elliot tallied up 10 tackles and an interception during the game. Additional interceptions by Greg Thrasher, Nick Clark, and Scott Lemn helped keep Bridgton in check.

Lemn's interception was returned just short of their opponent's end zone, setting

up a touchdown to help solidify a win.

When all was said and done, the Rams had gained 243 yards on the ground and 109 yards through the air with the defense only allowing 421 total yards.

"This game was much closer than the score would indicate. Our team showed a lot of heart and desire as they came from behind twice," said NAPS head coach Clayton Kendrick-Holmes.

NAPS moved to 4-3 on the season after handing the previously undefeated Wolverines their first loss. The Rams return to Annapolis this Friday for a rematch against the Mid-

Gearing worked hard at being independent and self-sufficient, and landed a job in tourism that entailed extensive traveling.

During his travels he faced barriers to public and private transportation, public buildings, hotels, restaurants and more.

"Our goal is to increase the visibility and capability of persons with disabilities as valued employees," he said. "I challenge the community of employers and business leaders to network to lower the barriers to employment. Together we can fight to make Rhode Island the best place to live and work in America."

Jen Kodis, an employment specialist with Good Will in Providence, came to the fair to see what is available.

"This is a wonderful opportunity to get familiar with this area and learn about all the resources that will be helpful in helping my clients," she said.

"This is a great opportunity to have information on so many services and resources all under one roof," said Capt. Robert McLaughlin, NAVSTA Commanding Officer.

Barbara Schlaroli, assistant executive director of the James L. Maher Center in Newport, said the Naval Station has been at the forefront of providing employment opportunities to the center's clients. The Maher Center provides skilled and education for physically and mentally challenged adults.

"Being employed opens up a whole new world for our clients," she said. "It allows them to be productive, contributing members of society.

Because of Naval Station's actions, others are finding out just how capable people with disabilities are."

Jen Moore, a translator from Allied Court Reporters in Cranston, uses her skills to help the hearing impaired understand speakers at assemblies. Words spoken are transcribed on a large screen.

"It allows the hearing impaired to participate fully by knowing word-for-word what is being said," said Ms. Moore "Even environmental sounds, such as applause, laughter, and so forth, are included."

Others guests included Paul Kilroy, who spoke on how service dogs are used to improve the quality of life for persons with disabilities.

Other participants staffing information stations included representatives for the Department of Defense's Computer/Electronic Accommodation Program (CAP) based in Church Falls, Va. CAP's mission is to provide solutions to the needs of people with disabilities with assistive technology, devices and services to eliminate barriers and pave access to jobs in the Department of Defense civilian workforce.

Co-coordinator Kathy Allen of the NAVSTA Command Support Department said she was pleased at the turnout.

"It was great participation by the organizations and vendors," she said.

"Even the vendors said they networked with each other to learn what services the other provided. Awareness is spreading. If only one person goes away with information that will help, I feel it was worth it."

and Security.” The last symposium, scheduled in October 2001, was canceled because of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

“I’m looking for a maritime NORAD,” Clark said later in a media availability. “We need a new level of operability, to share information globally.”

Clark said the global economy depends on the global security of today’s oceans, in that 99.7 percent of trade travels by sea in 46,000 vessels to 4,000 ports.

“We all operate in the largest maneuver space on the planet—the world’s oceans. They are the freeways of the world.”

Clark used an example of when a French oil supertanker was hit by terrorists in Yemen. It crippled the local fishing industry because of oil pollution in the Gulf of Aden,

and also increased insurance premiums for the oil shipping company. Yemen lost \$15 million a month in business because oil shippers put Yemen off limits. About 3,000 jobs were lost locally.

The Navy’s top officer says piracy on the high seas is on the increase. Two hundred thirty-four incidences were reported in the first six months of this year, a 34 percent increase over last year.

Although he admits there are copycat incidents unrelated to the terrorist network, al Qaeda is using our mutual maneuver space for politically motivated means.

“The success of the international war on terrorism will take teamwork and jointness,” he said. “Every navy brings critical capabilities to the fight. Let us build a partnership with the capabilities

to defeat terror.

“By rolling up our sleeves and working together, I believe we can create partnerships that will help our nations realize their fullest potential in so many ways and make it possible for our children and our children’s children to live in a world that is safe and free from fear of terror.”

In addition to the CNO, Coast Guard Commandant Adm. Thomas Collins and Secretary of the Navy Gordon R. England and spoke at luncheons at the Officers’ Club on Monday and Tuesday, respectively.

Collins echoed Clark’s effort for a maritime alliance, saying increased cooperation among the world’s maritime forces is essential to curb new threats posed by terrorists.

Williams, a former Army captain who served in Vietnam, said. “I am here to honor the fallen; honor the flag.”

He said Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld admitted in a recent media interview that things are not going well in the war against terrorism.

“Success with the terror war will depend on the resilience of the American people,” Williams said. “There will be other casualties; it will be a long war.”

He said the sooner the world comes together to address the terrorism problem, the sooner we will succeed.

Scheduled speaker Col. Dyer T. Lennox, senior Marine at the Naval War College, said every Marine knew where he was when word came of the Beirut bombing. He read an account by a Marine corporal who was 200 meters away when the largest non-nuclear explosion since World War II ripped the barracks, sending debris 1,000 yards away.

The corporal rushed to his commanding officer, who with tears in his eyes, said, “They’re gone; they’re all gone.”

Col. Lennox said much has been written about Beirut, and how the Marines became a peace

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

Walsh presented the awards, on behalf of Vice Adm. Timothy J. Keating, Commander U.S. Naval Forces Central Command/U.S. 5th Fleet, to Commanders Mike Haumer, Edward Takesuye, Jonathan Kan, Michael Poirer, and Jeffrey Curren.
