



Waiting for Isabel

Navy Region Northeast hunkers down for storm's fringe blast

Commander Navy Region Northeast set Tropical Cyclone Condition of Readiness (COR) III on Tuesday afternoon as the Navy continued to track the path of Hurricane Isabel. Under COR III, destructive winds are possible within 48 hours.

The Category 2 storm hit the East Coast at the Outer Banks of North Carolina, yesterday and proceeded northward over Virginia and Pennsylvania.

For southern New England, the National Weather Service predicted large sea swells and beach erosion at high tides, and blustery winds and occasional tropical downpours last night and today.

Chief Electrician's Mate (SW) Robert Bennett, Port Operations and Command Duty Officer earlier this week, said Naval Training Meteorology and Oceanography Detachment, Newport, monitored the storm and advised COMNRNE and Commanding Officer, Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport.

When hurricane winds are expected within 24 to 48 hours, under COR II and III, housing residents are advised to monitor the hurricane's progress, and check personal emergency supplies. They should stock flashlight batteries and candles, and bottled water. Outdoor objects such as lawn furniture, toys, and garden tools should be brought inside.

Isabel's projected path is still being plotted at the NAVSTA Quarterdeck, Building 690.

Greg O'Shea, assistant facilities manager for Morale, Welfare and Recreation Department, said nine Rhodes 19 sailboats were removed from the NAVSTA Marina and stored at Building 18, and windows were boarded up on the Blue and Red Decks at the Officers' Club on Tuesday.

Scott MacDonald, athletic director at Gym 109, said volleyball nets were taken down and picnic tables turned over at Carr Point Recreation Area.


Tennis nets were also removed in the Har Tru courts on Perry Road and behind Gym 109.

The NAVSTA Fire Department on Tuesday

checked fuel supplies in emergency generators and inspected the base for unsecured projectiles that could become airborne and cause damage.

Ensign Brad Hagel at the Public Works Department said a mobile generator was delivered to Building 690, NAVSTA Headquarters, and emergency water supplies were checked.

The storm passed north of the Caribbean last weekend at Category 5, with sustained winds as

high as 165 mph and gusts to 195. However, its forward speed this week was less than 8 knots, and winds had decreased to 110 mph.

About 40 ships and submarines under Commander, U.S. Second Fleet at Naval Station Norfolk, Va., put to sea Tuesday to ride out the storm. Several aircraft carriers remained secured pier-side.

When Navy Region Northeast expects tropical cyclones in the area, it works through Sub-Regional Planning Agents to set destructive weather Conditions of Readiness (CORs), based on a timeline for the arrival of destructive winds (sustained winds greater than 50 knots):

- Destructive Weather COR V. The normal readiness condition during hurricane season.
- Destructive Weather COR IV. Destructive winds are possible within 72 hours.
- Destructive Weather COR III. Destructive winds are possible within 48 hours.
- Destructive Weather COR II. Destructive winds are anticipated within 24 hours.
- Destructive Weather COR I. Destructive winds are anticipated within 12 hours.

The Navy Occupational and Safety and Health Office (NAVOSH) issued a safety bulletin on Monday on Hurricane and Major Storm Preparedness.

NWC remembers Sept. 11 losses

The Naval War College held a small ceremony Thursday, Sept. 11 to pay tribute to those who lost their lives in the terrorist attacks two years ago.

In his remarks, Rear Adm. Ronald A. Route, President of the College, recalled how lucky he was to be alive on that tragic day.

Route had just begun a presentation to the Chief of Naval Operations in his Pentagon office when the second aircraft struck the World Trade Center in New York City. Only 40 minutes later, the building Route was in became the next target.

"With a dull thud, we felt something - probably an airplane - had struck the Pentagon," said Route. "We could see some debris raining down on the parking lot outside and we all quickly headed for the nearest exit. We knew the next side of the building had been hit, the side with our offices in

it." Route and all of his immediate co-workers survived, but three Naval War College students and seven of its alumni were not as lucky.

The three Washington D.C.-based Fleet Seminar students killed were: Ms. Angela Houtz, 27, of LaPlata, Md.; Lt. Jonas Panik, 26, of Mingoville, Pa.; and Cmdr. Dan Shanower, 40, of Naperville, Ill.

The seven alumni were Capt. Gerald F. Deconto, 44, of Sandwich, Mass.; Lt. Cmdr. Robert R. Elseth, 37, of Vestal, N.Y.; Capt. Lawrence D. Getzfred, 57, of Elgin, Neb.; Cmdr. Patrick J. Murphy, 38, of Flossmoor, Ill.; retired Capt. Jack Panches, 51, of Clifton, Va.; Cmdr. Robert A. Schlegel, 38, of Gray, Maine; and Army Lt. Col. Kip Taylor, 38, of McLean, Va.

The names of the 10 heroes who perished on Sept. 11, 2001, are inscribed on the bronze plaque attached to the piece of limestone from the

Pentagon at the center of the War College's Patriots Memorial, said Route.

The ceremony marking the second anniversary of the attacks also included musical arrangements by the Newport Navy Choristers, a blessing by **WAR COLLEGE Page 16**



Patriot Day was initiated by President

Speaker says piracy could harbor terror threat

Students along with faculty and distinguished guests gathered at the Naval War College on Sept. 15 to listen to an informative lecture by maritime fraud specialist, John Martin.

Martin, an expert in the field of maritime piracy, gave his listeners some insight regarding the development of modern piracy in the



Asia Pacific area.

Each year, millions of dollars are lost to pirates who smuggle goods and steal

ships with their respective cargoes, either through hijacking or insurance fraud. Pirate crews belong to a broad conspiracy termed "the syndicate," which conducts business activities that enable the group to achieve its financial goals.

According to Martin, "the syndicate is a loose association of renegade shipping executives who know how to manipulate documents and commit fraud."

The group is believed to have been developed by governments who have ignored the public threat posed by maritime criminals and instead focused their attention on narrow financial interests.

Ultimately, the syndicate acquires its goals through a process known as "wrapping," whereupon groups of insiders work together to steal cargo by concealing the true origin of goods. Although the actual size is unknown, the syndicate incorporates people from a variety of countries throughout Asia.

Asia Pacific continues to be the central hub for maritime piracy because of the numerous ports and high density shipping traffic, making thorough investigations impossible.

Maritime piracy in the form of smuggling is currently not a

threat to the U.S. or to our vital shipping lanes. Nonetheless, a continuous threat to our national security exists due to the potential terrorist activity that maritime criminals have the skills to enact.

Martin's concern revolves around U.S. customs being inexperienced in dealing with terrorists who are willing to seek aggressive solutions to meet their goals.

An open forum discussion

followed Martin's lecture as listeners presented ideas regarding how the U.S. can curb the existing massive terrorist threat to our homeland. Increased dock security and boarding parties as well as a

variety of technical solutions were a few of the notable ideas discussed.

Martin believes that piracy investigators need to develop a more stringent plan for profiling shipping companies.





He said the promotion to chief petty officer is not based on past performance, but on what they Navy thinks they can do for the future.


“In my view, more than any other factor, the secret behind any successful command in this Navy is a great chief petty officers’ mess. You have the ability to make a difference.”







The NAPS football team provided a classic example of teamwork when they bulldozed over the Dean College Bulldogs of Franklin, Mass., last Saturday with a 56-23 win on the recently christened Nimitz Field.

Running up 348 yards of total offense enabled the Rams to remain in control of the game with relative ease, despite playing undermanned.

Plagued by early season injuries, Navy Prep was only able to dress 48 players as opposed to their normal full roster of 60. Regardless, the Rams remained focused and worked together as a cohesive unit to prevail.

The Rams' fullback Allen Ballard ran for two touchdowns, as did quarterback Troy Goss. The Rams supplemented their powerful ground game with a solid air attack that accounted for 95 yards of offense, including a touchdown reception.

"The offense is really beginning to understand one another and develop that unique sense of intuition," said Brian Wajert, the Rams' offensive coordinator.

The Rams' booming offense can be attributed to another solid defensive performance. Defensive Back Greg Thrasher returned an interception for a touchdown, and tackled their punter for a safety during the game.

Rams linebacker Matt Wimsatt had eight tackles on the day, while teammate Nick Clark added 10 tackles of his own along with a sack. Defensive lineman Amara Koroma also had an impressive game as the defense held the Bull-

USS Belleau Wood Amphibious Ready Group in the Gulf of Aden last September.

"Our remembrance ceremony last year was conducted at sea—our 83rd consecutive day at sea," he said. "The ceremony was held in the hangar bay and the temperature at 8 a.m. was already 96 degrees."

Solem said the Sailors put together a slide show of the tragic images of Sept. 11. The heart-wrenching 12-minute multi-media presentation was replayed for the students at OTC.

"I think it extremely important for us to reflect on the purpose of our military, and especially the Navy and Marine Corps, to be ready to be an active part of the global war on terrorism," he said.

"Our country continues to wage this war. The Sailors, who are our Navy's strength and

coming from OTCN's school houses, need to remain committed to the high standards of integrity, professionalism and heritage necessary to provide the freedoms our citizens deserve and expect."

He said the Navy and Marine Corps are no strangers to terrorist actions.

The Marine Barracks in Lebanon was bombed in the 1980s, the Kobar Towers housing U.S. servicemen in Saudi Arabia was bombed in the 90s, and the guided missile destroyer USS Cole was hit three years ago October.

"Stay ready and vigilant and committed to professional and personal excellence in all you do," he said. "God bless you all and our great nation."

The assembly then rose for a moment of silence and concluding ceremony.



"We definitely look forward to having an open week to recover, fix a few weak areas, and mentally prepare ourselves to face a powerhouse team," Kendrick-Holmes said.


