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



## Military members mix with Job Fair '04 crowd

More than 300 people searched the job market under one roof last week at Job Fair 2004 at the Newport Marriott in downtown Newport.

Co-sponsored by the Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) and the Newport County Chamber of Commerce, the fair mustered 50 representatives from various career fields, such as hospitality, health care, human services, food service, U.S. Armed Services, manufacturing, technical, professional, law enforcement and retail sales.

Whether transitioning from the military, looking for a first job or looking for a career change, job fairs create a less stressful environment than the traditional process. They are a unique employment search process where job seekers are able to meet with several employers from various fields at one location.

# Navy to enter Police Parade

Navy Newport will join forces with the men and women in blue from local civilian communities to celebrate National Police Week, May 9 to 15, with the Aquidneck Island National Police Parade on Sunday, May 2.

The parade, as well as others held across the country, pays tribute to the men and women who died in the line of duty the previous year, as well as those who currently serve and protect their communities.

Since its debut in the mid-1970s, the parade has drawn upwards of 70,000 spectators and 4,000 participants.

Local and state police

departments from all over Rhode Island and Massachusetts are scheduled to participate, as will numerous high school and bagpipe bands and drum and bugle corps.

The NAVSTA Police contingent will be represented by an honor guard, a cruiser, a bicycle patrol unit, and the K-9 unit of military working dog Dicky and her handler, Master-at-Arms Second Class Martin Branch and Master-at-Arms Seaman Amber Williams.

Other military units will include a color guard from Naval Ambulatory Care Center Newport and a fire pumper and firefighters from the NAVSTA Newport Fire Department.

## Final concert salutes trumpeter Miles Davis

Navy Band Northeast this weekend finishes its ninth annual Recital Series with “Miles on End,” featuring a variety of music made famous by jazz legend Miles Davis.

The final concert in the series is Sunday, May 2, at 3 p.m. in Spruance Hall, Naval War College.

Miles Davis (1926-1991) was one of 20th century’s greatest creative artists. Best known for being a trumpeter, Davis was also a bandleader and composer. His innovative style fueled his willingness to exper-

iment with music, making him one of the greatest improvisational performers to ever live.

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# Governor says Navy essential to healthy state

MIDDLETOWN — Gov. Don Carcieri praised both the Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) Division, Newport, and Raytheon Co. in Portsmouth for their work with Navy research and development, but says the state needs its schools to “tilt more to math and science” to fill technology demands in the future.

Rhode Island’s chief executive was the guest speaker last Thursday night at the Newport County Council of the Navy League’s 47th annual banquet

at the Atlantic Beach Club. A record 300 attended.

Carcieri called NUWC the “repository for the intellectual knowledge base” for all undersea warfare development in the country. But in a meeting in Washington earlier this year with Peter Brown, NUWC’s technical director for Sea Systems Command, Carcieri has concerns.

Carcieri said Brown fears that with the aging workforce of scientists and engineers currently on board, there are too few younger people with high tech skills to fill the void.

“We need to re-nourish this knowledge base,” Carcieri said.

“We need talents as a nation to be up to the task worldwide. We need a much greater emphasis on science and technology for the future.”

Carcieri said he was dazzled by a visit to Raytheon, whose Naval and Maritime Integrated Systems Division shares part of a \$2.9 billion Navy contract for the DD(X) high speed surface combatant.

“It’s like Star Wars down there,” he said. “The Arleigh Burke class of ship needs about 300 for a crew, but the DD(X) destroyer can do with 150. Its capabilities are staggering.”

He said Raytheon employs

1,750 people, and predicts 2,000 in the near future as the company ratchets up to develop electronics and weapons systems for the ship.

Carcieri said he’s well aware of the next Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC) round, and how it assesses Rhode Island.

He said the state is doing all it can to help the Navy keep costs down and operate efficiently, such as lowering electric rates and waste disposal tipping fees.

“BRAC looks at these things, but I’m reasonably optimistic,” he said. “Support of the military by the state is so impor-

tant.”

The governor said there is no nicer place to live in the world than Rhode Island, but it’s operating on a “C-minus or D grade.”

“We should be an ‘A’ state in the nation,” the former math teacher at Rogers High School said. “It’s just because of the way we ran ourselves over the years. But we should let our abilities blossom and try to unleash these talents.”

He said he’s very bullish about the possibilities in the Ocean State, particularly what’s happening on Aquidneck Island.

In 1952, a joint resolution by Congress and signed by President Truman, declared an annual, national day of prayer. In 1988, the law was amended and signed by President Reagan, permanently setting the day as the first Thursday of every May.

The National Day of Prayer has great significance for us as a nation. It enables us to recall and to teach the way in which our founding fathers sought the wisdom of God when faced with critical decisions. It stands as a call to us to humbly come before God, seeking His guidance for our leaders and His grace upon us as a people.

The unanimous passage of the bill establishing the National Day of Prayer as an annual event signifies that prayer is as important to our nation today as it was in the beginning.

# NWC student to command Blue Angels

Cmdr. Stephen R. Foley, a student at the Naval War College, has been selected to command the Navy's Flight Demonstration Squadron (The Blue Angels) for the 2005-2006 show seasons. Cmdr. Foley will take command of the Blue Angels during a change of command ceremony scheduled for Nov. 14 in Pensacola, Fla., at the completion of the 2004 show season.

Cmdr. Foley is a native of Charlestown, Mass., and a graduate of Hamilton College in Clinton, New York.

The mission of the Blue Angels is to enhance Navy recruiting, and represent Navy and Marine Corps aviation to the United

States and its Armed Forces, to America and other countries as international ambassadors of goodwill.

The Blue Angels serve as role models for the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps. They represent the best of naval aviation and Cmdr. Foley will make a superb addition to the team, according to Capt. W. J. "Jody" Richardson, a fellow aviator and instructor at the Naval War College.

More than 15 million people attended Blue Angels air shows during the 2003 show season. Since 1946, the team has had the privilege of performing for more than 380 million people.

Foley is completing a Master of Arts degree in National Security and Strategic Studies, and will graduate in June. He will then attend additional flight training before reporting to the Blue Angels.


He lives in Newport with his wife, Maureen, and their son Patrick.

## Band musician frocked to E-9

Senior Chief Musician Robert D. Ferreira was selected and frocked to master chief rate, E-9, on April 9 at the quarterdeck of Navy Band Northeast (NBNE).

Ferreira's collar devices were pinned on by NBNE director, Lt. Raymond Penland, and Master Chief Bill Stoller, Command Master Chief, Naval Station Newport.

The ceremony was attended by members of Navy Band Northeast.

Ferreira hails from Cape Cod, Mass., and enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1977. After recruit training in Great Lakes, Ill., he reported to the School of Music in Little Creek, Va., where he successfully completed the Basic Music Course of instruction in March of 1978.

His first tour of duty was with Navy Band San Francisco, serving as keyboard instrumentalist. After three and a half years he then received orders to Commander 7th Fleet Band Yokosuka, Japan, deployed onboard the USS

Blue Ridge (CC-19). He returned to the School of Music in 1983 for the Intermediate Course, and upon graduation reported for duty with Navy Band San Francisco.

Ferreira then transferred to Commander 6th Fleet Band Naples, Italy, and subsequently attended the School of Music in 1991 for the Enlisted Band Leader Course.

After graduation, he transferred to Navy Band Orlando, Fla., where he was selected and initiated a chief petty officer in September 1992. Upon

## Physics supervisor at NAPS to retire

Professor Clarice D. Anderes will retire June 30 from her position as the physics supervisor at the Naval Academy Preparatory School (NAPS).

Mrs. Anderes' educational background includes an undergraduate degree in physics from Barnard College, Columbia University (1958), and a master's degree from New York University (1962).

Following the completion of all her Ph.D. course work at New York University, she joined the staff at NAPS. Arriving on Feb. 12, 1979, her first assignment was the most challenging job given to any NAPS science instructor: instruct two sections of chemistry and one section of physics.

Despite the challenges of joining the staff in the middle of the academic year, she excelled in her new position and was subsequently appointed to the position of Science Supervisor in March 1982.

She was renamed the Physics Supervisor in July of 2002 when the science department was divided into Physics and Chemistry.

Outside the classroom, Mrs. Anderes arranged a meeting of the New England Section-American Association of Physics Teachers (NES-AAPT) on the Newport Naval facility which involved the War College and Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC). For

ten years, she served this organization on national committees and as a regional treasurer.

During her 25-year career at NAPS, she has taught almost 1,100 students, devoting numerous hours beyond the regular working day to provide academic, personal and career counseling.

"The NAPS experience has been a delightful opportunity because they have expanded my subject matter knowledge and computer skills, and have given me the inspiration, through their teamwork and friendliness, to devote my best effort to the job," she said.



The RV Park opens for the season on Friday, May 28 and remains open through October. Call 841-3116.


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
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# Military colleges put on game faces







**Bomb on 'dhow' kills 2 Sailors**

MANAMA, Bahrain (NNS) — Two U.S. Navy Sailors from a coalition boarding team were killed and four other crew members wounded April 24 as a result of three concurrent waterborne attacks on oil terminals located in the northern Arabian Gulf.

At approximately 5 p.m. (local) coalition naval personnel observed an unidentified dhow approaching the Khawr Al Amaya Oil Terminal (KAAOT) in the northern Arabian Gulf. Standard Maritime Interception Operations (MIO) procedures required the crew to board the dhow for inspection.

As the seven-member boarding team approached the dhow in a rigid hull inflatable boat (RHIB), the dhow exploded, flipping the RHIB and throwing the crew into the water, killing two and wounding four.

**Senior enlisted in joint classes**

NORFOLK, Va. (NNS) — U.S. Joint Forces Command (USJF-COM) took a first step in kicking off a new CAPSTONE program April 27-28 with a two-day course, known as the Command Senior Enlisted Leader CAPSTONE Joint Operations Module (JOM), at the Joint Warfighting Center (JWFC) here.

The course will provide Army command sergeant majors, Marine Corps sergeant majors, Navy and Coast Guard command master chiefs and Air Force command chief master sergeants with the tools they will need in a world where no service goes to war by itself, according to course organizers.

During the course, JWFC observer-trainers will educate command senior enlisted leaders on many topics based on the life cycle of a JTF headquarters. Those topics include: forming the JTF; joint manning document development; joint command and control; joint basing; and integration of special operating forces.

The need for a new CAPSTONE program for the command senior enlisted leadership first arose during Operation Enduring Freedom.
