

NUWC changes command, called 'national treasure'

The Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) was described as a "national treasure" with a \$1 billion annual budget, in change of command ceremonies last Friday.

Rear Adm. Stephen E. Johnson took the helm as Commander, NUWC, from Rear Adm. William G. Timme.

Guest speaker was Vice Adm. Phillip M. Balisle, Commander, Naval Sea Systems' Command, the parent command to NUWC.

He said NUWC has stood out as a bold leader with vision and perseverance during the challenge of Navy realignment and "defense budget battles raging" in Washington.

"Leaders in our research centers continue to serve the Navy and the nation well," he said. "Their success is measured in accomplishments."

He said anti-submarine warfare, strike warfare, the Chief of Naval Operation's doctrine on FORCE net, homeland security...all benefit from NUWC's expertise and talented team.

"This command is serious about whatever it takes to serve our undersea customers," he said.

Timme, in turning the helm over to Johnson, said NUWC is fully involved in supporting the fleet going to war.

The Senior Enlisted Academy graduated its eighth Command Master Chief/Chief of the Boat (CMC/COB) class on the May 20 Naval Station Newport.

The Command Master Chief/Chief of the Boat (CMC/COB) Course is a capstone program that provides selected personnel with "just in time" learning experience designed to help them further develop the unique perspective and special skills needed to serve as vital members of their command's leadership triad: commanding officer, executive officer and the command master chief.

Building on the foundation of the Navy Leadership Competency Model, the course utilizes both facilitated seminars and comprehensive group case study analysis to achieve its objective of preparing CMC/COBs for the most demanding assignments in the Navy.

Command master chiefs/chiefs of the boat are the senior enlisted leaders who report directly to their respective commanders/commanding officers. They participate in formulating and imple-

menting policies concerning morale, welfare, job satisfaction, discipline, utilization and training of the Navy enlisted personnel. They also work closely with the executive officer in the dissemination and promotion of command policy and maintaining the effectiveness and efficiency of the chain of command.

Master Chief (SS/SW) James Anderson, one of the course facilitators said, "The Command Master Chief/Chief of the Boat Course provides valuable real world training and



Submarine crew in town parade

PAWTUXET, R.I. — Approximately 18 members of the Gold Crew of the Trident submarine USS Rhode Island will march in the 39th Gaspee Days Parade on June 12 in Pawtuxet, for the first time.

The parade celebrates action taken by colonists from Rhode Island who burned the British

Revenue schooner, HMS Gaspee in June 1772 in what has been recognized as the first overt action leading to the American Revolutionary War.

The Gold Crew is under the command of Commander Peter Clarke. The submarine is based in Kings Bay, Ga., but was built by General Dynamics-Electric Boat in Groton, Conn.

The fleet ballistic missile submarine was commissioned July 9, 1994, at the former Naval Education and Training Center, now Naval Station Newport.

On Monday, Capt. Clarke, the Chief of the Boat, and crew members will speak at the Portsmouth Middle School. Some Grade 5 school children have been corresponding with the boat's crew for the past four years.

Boy Scout Troop 82 and Cub Scout Pack 50 have sent the USS Rhode Island letters, magazines, and art work over the

past several years. Many of those scouts will also attend the assembly.



Each country representative took approximately three minutes to present his or her international dress and/or culture on stage. Countries were accompanied with appropriate national music.









Navy christens newest Seawolf

GROTON, Conn. (NNS) — The Navy's newest Seawolf-class nuclear-powered submarine, Jimmy Carter, was christened June 5 during a ceremony at General Dynamics Electric Boat in Groton.

The submarine honors the 39th president of the United States. Carter is the only U.S. president to qualify in submarines. He has distinguished himself by a lifetime of public service, and has long ties to the Navy and the submarine force.

He is a 1946 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, served as an officer aboard submarines while in uniform, and served as commander-in-chief from 1977-1981. Carter's statesmanship, philanthropy and sense of humanity have made him one of the most influential Americans of the late 20th century.

James R. Schlesinger, a former secretary of both defense and energy and former director of the Central Intelligence Agency, delivered the ceremony's principal address. Schlesinger served under Carter as the nation's first secretary of energy.

Rosalynn Carter is the boat's sponsor, and in a time honored Navy tradition broke a bottle of champagne across the bow.

Jimmy Carter is the third and final submarine of the Seawolf class.

Security details guarding oil rigs

ABOARD USS LEYTE GULF, At Sea (NNS) — A small contingency of Naval Coastal Warfare Group (NCWG) 1 is currently living aboard the Khwar Al Amaya Oil Terminal (KAAOT) and the Al Basrah Oil Terminal (ABOT) to provide surveillance and communications support to further enhance security.

The detachments arrived on the terminals with a reaction platoon of Marines from the Interim Marine Corps Security Force company out of Bahrain April 29, following an attack that killed two U.S. Navy Sailors and one Coast Guardsman April 24.

NCWG 1, based in Kuwait, provides operational, planning, training and administrative support of 22 commis-

sioned hardware equipped Mobile Inshore Undersea Warfare Units, Inshore Boat Units (IBU) and Harbor Defense Command (HDC) surveillance units in support of fleet operations.

"We work in conjunction with the ships in the area, and with the Marine and Iraqi Security Forces on the terminals," said Chief Damage Controlman Scott Martin, officer in charge of the detachment positioned on ABOT.

Using various methods and types of equipment for surveillance, NCW is the first line of defense in locating and identifying potential threats to the security of oil terminals.

Veterans recall Battle of Midway

WASHINGTON (NNS) — More than 300 veterans, families and other visitors honored the sacrifices and efforts of U.S. and allied forces from the Battle of Midway during a wreath-laying ceremony at the Navy Memorial in Washington,

D.C., May 28.

The event kicked off a week-end of events culminating in the long-awaited dedication of the World War II Memorial on the National Mall.

Among the guest speakers at the Navy Memorial event was Academy Award nominee Tony Curtis. Curtis enlisted in the Navy at age 17 in 1943.

"The Navy looked after me like they were my mother," Curtis said fondly.

Rear Adm. Jan Cody Gaudio, commandant, Naval District Washington, and Pierce J. Johnson, president and executive officer of the Navy Memorial Foundation, shared the honors of placing a wreath at the Lone Sailor Statue.

Retired Capt. John W. Crawford, another speaker at the Navy Memorial, said, "Given the magnitude of the victory, we need to understand its causes, competence, leadership and courage....My earnest hope is for ceremonies like this to spread across the nation to teach our schoolchildren the

history of the Battle of Midway."

The Navy Ceremonial Guard, the Navy Band and a contingent of Marines from the 8th and I Barracks also helped commemorate the event.

Mini-missile completes test

CHINA LAKE, Calif. (NNS) — Spike, the world's smallest, image-guided, fire-and-forget missile, accomplished its first controlled flight May 26.

In three test flights totaling slightly less than 60 seconds, the diminutive missile (5.3 pounds, 25-inches long) successfully demonstrated more than a dozen critical functions.

"This paves the way for self-guided flight tests in 2004," said China Lake engineer Steve Felix, the Spike project manager.

Originally conceived as a man-portable weapon for

Marines and Navy special operations groups, which have supported the weapon's development, Spike fills a critical niche for a low cost, lightweight guided weapon for U.S. ground forces.

With only 15 minutes of training, ground troops will be able to effectively engage soft and lightly armored targets at ranges up to two miles. Plus, Spike's precision guidance reduces the risk of collateral damage.

Its lightweight and low cost (about \$4,000 per missile) make it suitable for wide distribution among front-line units and cost effective even against low-value targets.

Spike's potential applications go beyond ground combat. It is a realistic armament choice for tactical unmanned aerial vehicles, as well as a force-protection weapon to defend surface ships from small-boat swarms and light aircraft.

In all three flights, Spike accelerated to 600 miles per hour in under 1.5 seconds.
